Nomination Meeting

(Continued from Page 1) Twenty-two nominees for public office in Georgetown, spoke at a meeting Thursday which followed the one hour nominating period. Assessment Commissioner Joseph Gibbons was chairman, as had been decided by the town council earlier in the week, and he introduced sitting councillors in alphabetical order, the three senior council members, and then nominees in their order of nomination. Mr. Gibbons, a past mayor, told the audience that this was the 42nd consecutive town nomination he had attended. His plea for co-operation in conducting the meeting with dignity and despatch was heeded. Most candidates limited their speeches to less than the allotted ten minutes and there was a minimum of comment from the audience. Only one ratepayer, Alex Marshment, took advantage of Mr. Gibbons' offer to allow questions after each speech.

WANTS TOWN MANAGER
Ward 1 council candidate Don Barrager said that his suggestion of a town manager made to council this year is uppermost in his platform. "I feel such a man would pay for himself in the first year," he said, urging that a manager is a "must" in a town of 10,000. The system has proved its effectiveness in Guelph, he claimed.

HATE IMPEDES PROGRESS
Pointed reference to the bribery attempt charge laid against developer Rex Heslop on information supplied by Mayor Hyde was made by Jim Brown seeking a Ward 3 council seat. "Our progress is being impeded by a war of hate and recent moves will neither solve nor shorten the war," he said, in a hard-hitting speech. "Tape recordings and phone tapping smack of secret police methods and such a picture is dangerous and distasteful." Mr. Brown said he had been highly critical in his first council year of committee appointments. Elected to represent east Georgetown which had a road problem, he found himself chairman of recreation, hospital and ambulance, with no consultation.

"The job was one of small import which, to have any meaning would have to be developed by the chairman himself," he said, "and none of the reasons since given for my appointment have justified it." However, he had soon been invited to sit in on other committee meetings, he continued, and had done his best for recreation. Grants for baseball equipment and to the international hockey week, and a recent \$450 grant for outdoor skating rinks were some of his committee accomplishments, he said.

"You'll find I am no jellyfish. There have been times of sharp disagreement and there will be again," he concluded, "but this has not ended with animosity. I advise ratepayers to make a careful selection when voting this year."

PLANNING ESSENTIAL
"Many problems facing our town can and will be resolved through the combined efforts of next year's council initiating a program of sound, efficient planning," was the forecast of Bob Burke, candidate for deputy reeve. Mr. Burke said he would suggest such a program as a necessity and make sure that Georgetown's position in county council would be one of precedence.

Sod Turning Ceremony New County Building

The first sod was turned Thursday, November 16th symbolizing the start on the new County Building being built on a 10 acre site just north of Milton. Warden A. Phillips and Judge G. E. Elliott turned the sod in the dismal grey weather while Acton's Reeve R. J. Hargrave, chairman of the county building committee, presided for the brief ceremony.

CONTROLLED DEVELOPMENT

"My platform was stated in the two newspapers this week—controlled development, honesty and hard work," said Jim Emmerson, a Ward 2 candidate. Mr. Emmerson thinks a proper industrial-commercial ratio is the only procedure for a town and council has no right to gamble on any other policy. One of his qualifications, he said, is a job which allows him to take time to attend meetings during the day as well as in the evenings.

NEED FACTORIES

Another councillor contesting a higher office, William F. Hunter, is a candidate for deputy reeve and he stated that more industrial assessment is the prime need for Georgetown. He complimented Mr. Eustler and Mr. Kramer for building small factories "on spec." "Industry wants to move in tomorrow without waiting for a building and if we have factories available I know they will soon be filled," he said.

TOUGH CAMPAIGN

Promising "a tough campaign with all the vigour I possess," John Elliott announced he would try to step up from deputy reeve after a year in that post plus three prior years on council. "Council work is not a chore. To me it is a way of life, wanting to help everybody. I have only one life to give and I want to give it to Georgetown," he said. "A vote for Elliott will unite the town in bonds of friendship and mutual understanding." He denied Mr. Cass' remarks about the budget. "It's balanced and I'm proud of it. It's fabulous. It's balanced so well it's abnormal," said the deputy reeve, who is finance chairman this year. "I had nothing to do with the water report, and was not on that committee," he added. Mr. Elliott said he neither fights nor favours Mr. Heslop, but that no formula can supplement industry for sound prosperity. Concessions should be given to new industry, fact-
