#### Outlines Procedure To Choose Architect

Dear Mr. Editor:

References have been made in the local press in recent weeks to bidding by architects for Public School building projects. Since these references have unintentionally created an erroneous impression of the actual procedure followed, the Public School Board requests you to publish this letter in order that the facts may be known.

School Boards in general, engage architects on the basis of their experience and reputation in the field, their ability to provide complete and reliable services of the type desired and their availability at the time the services are required. No matter who the architect, his services will cost a Board engaging him 6% of the contract price of the project. The actual contract price is not known until the building has been designed, details approved by the Board and the Ontario Department of Education, tenders for its construction called for and one of those tenders accepted by the Board. Thus there can be no bidding on the part of an architect to the term is generally understood. When a School Board decides to add to its plant, it receives as a matter of course a number of letters from architects interested in the project but these letters do not and cannot quote prices for services.

The George Kennedy Public School was designed as a complete unit by John B. Parkin Associates. The present building is only a part of that complete unit, the remainder of which will be built as circumstances dictate. As long as the Board is satisfied with the quality of the services provided by Parkin (and such is the case) it would be foolhardy and costly in both time and money to engage a different architect for the proposed addition.

Thank you for giving us space to set this matter straight.
