Brads' Goalie Injured Allows Raider Catch-Up

But Nine Players No Match Saturday

Bradford Brads' Fords are taking a long look at their goal tending situation this week.

The only club in the COHL without a spare netminder, Bradford almost dropped two points here Friday night because of their goalie shortage. And despite sponsor Brad Walker's pleas for another waiver to provide the necessary extra puckateer, the COHL teams vetoed the idea claiming Bradford should have had the foresight to sign a second goaler before all the players cards were used up.

Stitched

The incident that glaringly exemplified the need came with five minutes to go in Friday night's Raider-Bradford game here when regular netminder took a cut over his right eye with five minutes to go in the game and had to go to hospital for some needlework.

When the referee waved the club back to the ice after a sufficient delay Kelly, a rearguard, had to fill in for the absent goalie, and thanks to some erratic shooting, and lady luck, he weathered the remaining time with Dave Irons goal, the only blotch on his brief netminding career. That one tied the game at 6-6 and a possible overtime was washed out to be played the next time Bradford and Georgetown meet on Georgetown ice. That will be Friday, January 5th.

Satisfied

Though the Raiders got a big break in the Bradford goalie's absence, they never did produce the flood of goals they should have against their badly crippled opponents, and the Fords were satisfied to skate off with the deadlock. Raiders, who looked sadly outclassed at times, apparently left with the same attitude.

Bradford pulled into a 4-1 cushion in the first frame on goals by Nicholas (2), Cosburn and Davis, while Don Hunter, announced his return to the Raider line-up with their only marker.

Rallied

It was all Georgetown in the middle stanza. Wayne Thompson from Hunter at 3:58, Frazer Dunn, a former Ford, at 6:38, and Junior Beaumont from Irons and Blake Inglis at 13:55 made a brand new game of it starting the third.

Cosburn and Fordham regained a two goal lead for the visitors before the period was half over, but Wayne Thompson from Demers at 14:23 and then Irons' goal on Kelly at 16:43 caused the saw-off.

Short Handed

Out of a possible 22 (twenty-two) players, just 9 (nine) Raiders showed up for the return game Saturday night in marshville, and it was obvious from the time the teams took the ice that the question in this one wasn't who, but by how many.

As it turned out Bradford punched 11 goals past unguarded Alf Trotta in the Raiders cage while up front the skeleton crew toiled hard enough to notch 4 goals in their effort to keep the score decent.

Raider snipers were Frazer Dunn, Blake Inglis, Bob Demers and Doug Richardson. Oddly enough the Raiders stayed even in the final period when both clubs scored a pair,

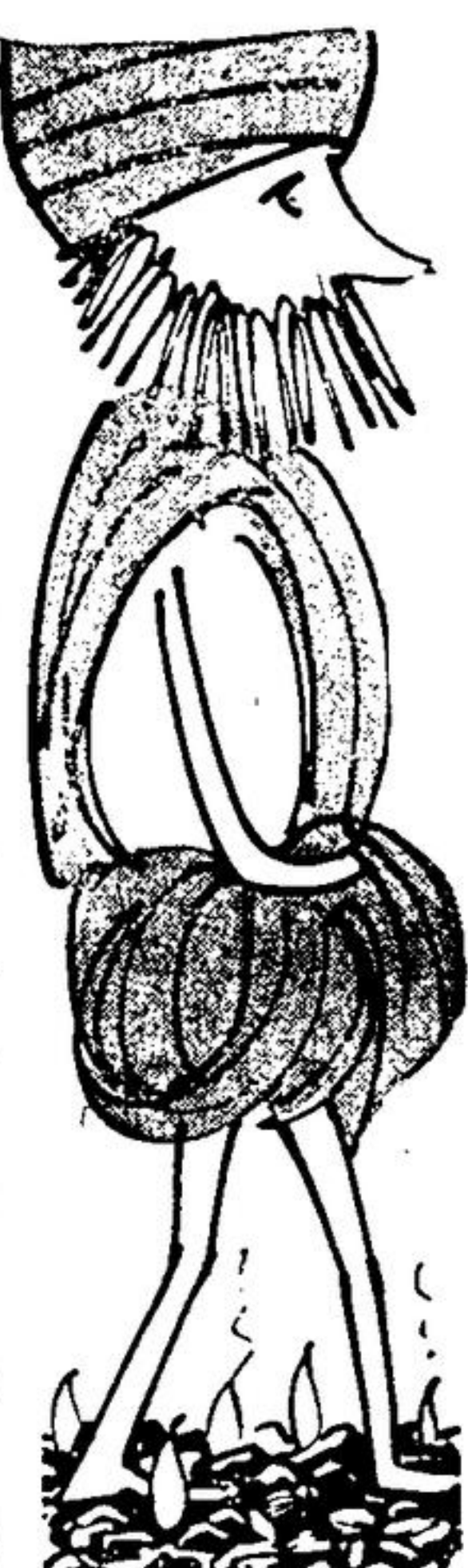
