Helped India Develop Manufacturing Skills

A layman who has spent six years for the United Church in India was the speaker Sunday morning at the United Church. Mr. R. Eddie of Klemburg has been a sawmill owner and gave his services along this line to establish the natives in that work and so make them self supporting. The average farmer there has 1/2 acres to work and so has about six months idleness. His income averages the incredible amount annually of \$69.00. To help them increase this means so very much.

It is here that Mr. Eddie has helped in establishing a sawmill, a furniture factory and the latest project, the manufacture of ploughs. The company can make the farmers a steel plough to replace the old wood one for the small sum of three dollars. He said Indians are desperately needed to teach the skills and are very much appreciated by them.
