Discuss Hornby Site For Composite School

Tentative plans for a second new school in Esquewaugh township school area were reviewed Wednesday, November 22, when school board members met at the home of trustee R. J. Cunningham. Members had previously agreed to the erection of a new school at Limehouse.

During the meeting, members learned that tests taken for a water supply at the Limehouse site indicated that a reservoir might have to be installed to assure an adequate supply of water.

Second School
The second proposed school may possibly be built in the Hornby area after a suitable site is located. During the meeting, several sites were discussed, but no decision was reached.

The board members will meet with the architects at the Limehouse site in the near future and sketch plans are expected to be ready soon. The board expressed their sorrow when they learned of

the sudden death of Lloyd Doan of St. Marys, who was killed Saturday in a car accident in the city of Stratford. Mr. Doan was engaged just two weeks ago as assistant supply principal for the Glen Williams and Speyside schools.

Other decisions made during the meeting included installing a heater in the staff room at Norval school and floodlighting the Speyside school.

Would Allow Voters Campaign Donations

Ottawa (Special). Will Canadians send money to the political party of their choice if urged to do so through a non-partisan campaign, and if the proper machinery exists for collecting such contributions?

Frank McGee, Conservative member for York-Scarborough, thinks that many would if legislation was introduced to make it possible. Earlier this year he sponsored a bill in the House of Commons with a view to amending the Canada Elections Act for this purpose. His hope is to promote broader participation in election and campaign expenses on the part of the general public.

Basis for his suggestion is an experiment conducted in the United States in 1958. At the same time, Mr. McGee makes no secret of the fact that his bill is designed, in part, to take the wind out of the sails of the New Democratic Party, which is now busy instituting a system of compulsory contributions through union dues.

"This approach to campaign giving would lessen the dependence of political organizations and candidates on wealthy contributors and on special interests," Mr. McGee points out. "It would stimulate men and women of lesser means to run for public office. Above all, it would add new vigour to our two-party system by encouraging our citizens to take a livelier interest in political activity. A person who has a stake, however small, in a political party is far more likely to take a sustained interest in its activities."

U.S. Example
Mr. McGee's proposal is based on an experiment of the American Heritage Foundation which launched a campaign with the slogan — 'Don't Pass the Buck — Give a Buck to the Party of Your Choice.' A sample of American public opinion indicated that 17 million families would be willing to contribute at least \$5 each if someone asked for it and means were provided for making contributions.

Despite mistakes, the U.S. experiment collected about \$15 million in a non-presidential election. The Heritage Foundation estimated that some \$35 to \$40 million could have been collected.

which was talked out on second reading as have been similar bills in recent years. Mr. Martin argues that it isn't the giving of money to political parties that is wrong, but rather the secrecy that surrounds such donations.

Just As Evil
"Some have tried to create the impression that it is just as evil for say a million members of the Canadian Labor Congress to contribute their 60c a year to the New Democratic Party as it would before one individual to contribute \$800,000 a year to one of the other parties," notes Mr. Martin. "Any reasonable man will realize there is a great deal of difference. A 60 cent contribution would not place him in the same preferred position that a much larger contribution would place an individual seeking government favours."

Members of other parties claim that disclosing the names of contributors would be tantamount to denying them of the right of a secret ballot.
