defined speed and the results were analyzed. It was found that a swept rock will travel 18 feet 7 inches farther than an unswept rock on a new sheet of ice. After a sheet has been used for some time the effect of the sweeping is not so great, but there is enough difference to carry the rock right through the house. The amount of curl can also be controlled with sweeping. There is a difference of approximately 8 inches between a swept rock and an unswept one, according to the tests. So when the skip calls sweep, you better sweep.

Some surprising upsets were recorded last week in the club draw. One team who were coming home, leading by four points, saw that lead wiped out and were beaten by one shot, and they had the last rock. But don't laugh — it could be you the next time around.

A couple of lopsided scores last week were a 20 to 4 drubbing and a 14 to 1 pasting by another team a couple of nights later. And the two losing teams have won their share of the games so far this season.

JUVENILE HOCKEY

Georgetown's rejuvenated Juvenile hockey team broke the famine this week after a dismal start to the season, taking back to back games over Preston and Dixie.

In Preston, Georgetown's high flying juveniles provided goalie Ernie Pearce with his first shut-out of the year. Quite a change to the very little protection to their goalie in early season games. The local's defence bolstered by the addition of Danny Robson played a flawless game. The scoring was led by one of the defensive unit in Bill Carney. Carney started the play that resulted in the first goal taking the puck down the ice and firing it around the corner. Ed White dug the puck out and passed it to Gord Lee who slid it right past the startled Preston goalie. Georgetown's second goal was scored by Carney on a rink-long dash; he was steered in behind the goal. Thinking very quickly and catching the Preston goalie napping, he reached around from behind the net and tucked the puck into the open corner. This was the end of the scoring by Georgetown but they missed scoring chances time and time again. Marchand and Heppes both missed on breakaways, Marchand missed the open corner with the Preston goalie well out of position. Basically it was a team effort with every player digging hard.

In Georgetown on Wednesday the local juveniles crew hammered a very good positional playing Dixie squad 7-4 in an exhibition game. Two goal efforts were turned in by Marchand and Morrow with singles going to Campbell, Marchand, and Harvey. Only better conditioning of the local crew and more drive kept Dixie from getting close to Georgetown. Playing their second game in less than 24 hours Georgetown's defence was slightly weakened with the loss of Bill Carney out with a leg injury. Marchand filled in very capably. The two goals by Marchand went right through the rigging in the net, but alert refereeing caught both goals. Georgetown travels to Orangeville for the next league game on Tuesday night and are home on Wednesday against Hamilton.
