**Jonathan Neilson Township Native**

Scotch Block lost another of its aged citizens in the passing of Jonathan Neilson at the home of his daughter, Mrs. W. Greenlees at Campbellville early Saturday November 25th.

Born February 7, 1878, in Esquesing township, he was the second of seven children of Daniel and Samantha Neilson. Before his retirement to Peru, near Milton, he farmed for over twenty years on the Fifth Line, Esquesing, where he took pride in his percheron horses. Being a general handyman, he did his own blacksmithing and carpentering as the need arose.

In 1907 Mr. Neilson was married to Mary Anne McEwen, who predeceased him in December 1924. He is survived by his second wife, Mary Ellen (Mollie) Stark, whom he married in 1938, and two daughters, Mrs. A. W. Benton (Isabella) of Limehouse and Mrs. Wilfrid Greenlees (Charlotte) of Campbellville. Four grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

One sister, Mrs. George Pearson (Mary) of Milton, and one brother, Mr. William Neilson of Hillsburgh also survive him.

The funeral at the MacNab and Son Funeral Chapel, Milton on November 27, was conducted by Rev. B. Nevin, minister of Boston Presbyterian Church where Mr. Neilson was a member. Interment followed in Evergreen Cemetery, Milton.

**Safety Council Seeks New Crest**

J. A. F. J. H. Taylor, chairman of the Halton Farm Safety Council, has announced that the Council will sponsor a Crest Competition.

In order to obtain the best possible Crest for the Farm Safety Council of Ontario, the Council has decided to accept one Crest from each county. Halton's entry will be selected from entries in the competition sponsored by the Halton Farm Safety Council.

The Halton farm safety council is an organization representing farm organizations within the county. Its purpose is to direct farm safety programmes that will benefit Halton's farm people.

Farming is one of the most dangerous occupations, and the farm one of the most dangerous places to live. This should not be, for accidents can be prevented.

Two years ago every county and district in Ontario conducted a farm accident survey. This survey pointed out the need for Farm Safety. When the survey was completed, county and provincial farm safety councils were formed to direct farm safety programs in the county and Province.

As an example of one of these programmes, in the first year of operation the Halton Farm Safety Council was responsible for 34 farm people taking First Aid courses. These people received training and certificates for St. John Ambulance.

While a Crest itself will not prevent farm accidents, it can be a useful tool to promote farm safety.

This competition is open to all farm people in Halton, but only one entry per family. To stimulate interest, total prize money of \$100 is offered.
