"She can hear, she can hear," a sobbing mother cried to doctors and nurses last Wednesday at a Toronto hospital.

It was the end of a lifetime of muffled silence for seven-year old Lily Potts, foster daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gear Hayes, 99 George Street.

From birth, this orphan girl had never heard a sound, until last week, when a hearing aid brought the wester of unknown sound to her rebuilt eardrum.

In August, an operation paid for by the Children's Aid, was performed using skin from her leg to build the eardrum, and finally this week a hearing aid could be used.

Any miracle here was wrought by love — the love that made a mother of five take in an unwanted, rejected, completely deaf child. Four years ago Mrs. Hayes told her husband she had nowhere.

to go on holidays from the Belleville School for the Deaf. Quietly he said, "Let her come here."

This was not from a wealthy man to whom one child more makes little difference. This was from an average man, rich in humanity, who is himself now so crippled with arthritis he cannot work.

From that day, Mr. and Mrs. Hayes became Mum and Dad. The Lily wants a watch for Christmas, perhaps to hold it up to her ear, and listen to this world. Mrs. Hayes tells this smilingly, accepting the fact this is beyond their reach. But her oldest son, who has a paper route has offered to help his Mum buy the watch for his sister, (not foster, sister in this house).
