Less Unemployment Than a Year Ago

The National Employment Service placed 249 persons in jobs during November, 1961. This was slightly more than were placed during November a year ago, when 238 persons were placed.

A significant change is indicated in the number of persons registered for work. At the end of November, 1961, there were 1,936 persons registered — a drop of 358 from the number registered at the same time last year. Then 1,394 were listed as seeking work.
