



TORONTO PAPER FEATURES STREET LIGHTS

GEORGETOWN'S controversial centre street lights in the downtown business section came in for comment in Friday's home edition of the Toronto Globe and Mail. Headed up 'Georgetown Project' the article under the Globe's Building and Real Estate column had this to say:

The cooperation of provincial and municipal officials with the downtown business community in Georgetown, 4 1/2 miles northwest of Toronto, to improve lighting, traffic control and parking is revitalizing the centre of the town, making it competitive with the brightest shopping area.

New store fronts are appearing along the main street which has been widened and freed from the congestion of angle parking. Safety islands and street lights have been placed in the middle of the road. Parking lots are being developed behind the stores and these eventually will ring the downtown section. All the stores then will have back and front entrances and neither delivery truck nor shoppers' cars will have to clog the street. Presence of the parking lots is expected to draw new chain stores to the downtown section. Some merchants who have no property to make available for

parking are contributing cash toward the new lots. Their advice indicated how both traffic control and lighting could be improved at once. Georgetown is believed to be the first town of its size in Canada to meet these problems with a centre strip of lights and islands.
