### Return Clark Reeve of Chingacousy Township

Reeve Cyril Clark was returned as head of Chingacousy's 62 council. He defeated former Deputy Reeve Norman by 399 votes in an election that was indecisive till the last moment. Councillor George Gardhouse in the deputyreeveship, defeating Councillor Howard Stewart by 274 votes. Ed Blair captured the vacant ward Three seat by polling 40 votes to Ron King's 131. Councillor Frank Ward Two, was re-elected by a 392 to 75 vote over Edward (B. G.) Thomas. A capacity crowd jammed the municipal offices at Snelgrove watch Reeve Clark jump into early lead as he pulled large majorities in the Victoria, Sand II and Mayfield areas.

#### Question Mark

As time wore on, the polls in Attonville and Bramalea became the large question-mark, it they failed to prove the deep that some speculation anticipated. The final count as 1,598 to 1,189. #### School Board

In the school board race, Robert Tate was re-elected to Chingacousy's Ward Five seat with a majority of 272 while in Ward Three, Fred Kee defeated former school trustee Dick Brown. Council seats won by acclamation were H. T. Wilson, Ward Four; Gordon Lowe, Ward One; and Ron Weir, Ward Five.

### Mrs. Joseph Sanford Prominent in Church Activities

A resident of Stewarttown since 1923, Minnie Florence Sanford, 76, died suddenly at her home, early Wednesday morning, December 6th. Born in Birmingham, England, she was the daughter of Leonard Joseph Taylor, and Sarah Ann Lamb. April 29th, 1906, she married Joseph Edward Sanford, at St. Silas Church, Birmingham.

After coming to Canada, they lived at Smithfield and Mount Dennis, before coming to Stewarttown.

Mrs. Sanford was a member of St. John's Anglican Church where she took an active part in the choir, the W.A. and the Guild. She was also a member of E-questing Women's Institute.

Mr. Sanford predeceased her in January 29th, 1959, and their only son, Edward Joseph on December 26th, 1956.

She is survived by one grand son, Bill, of Limehouse. Two sisters, Dorothy (Mrs. Heath) of Clarkson; Kate (Mrs. P. Hill) of Birmingham, England and one brother, Gilbert Taylor also of Birmingham.

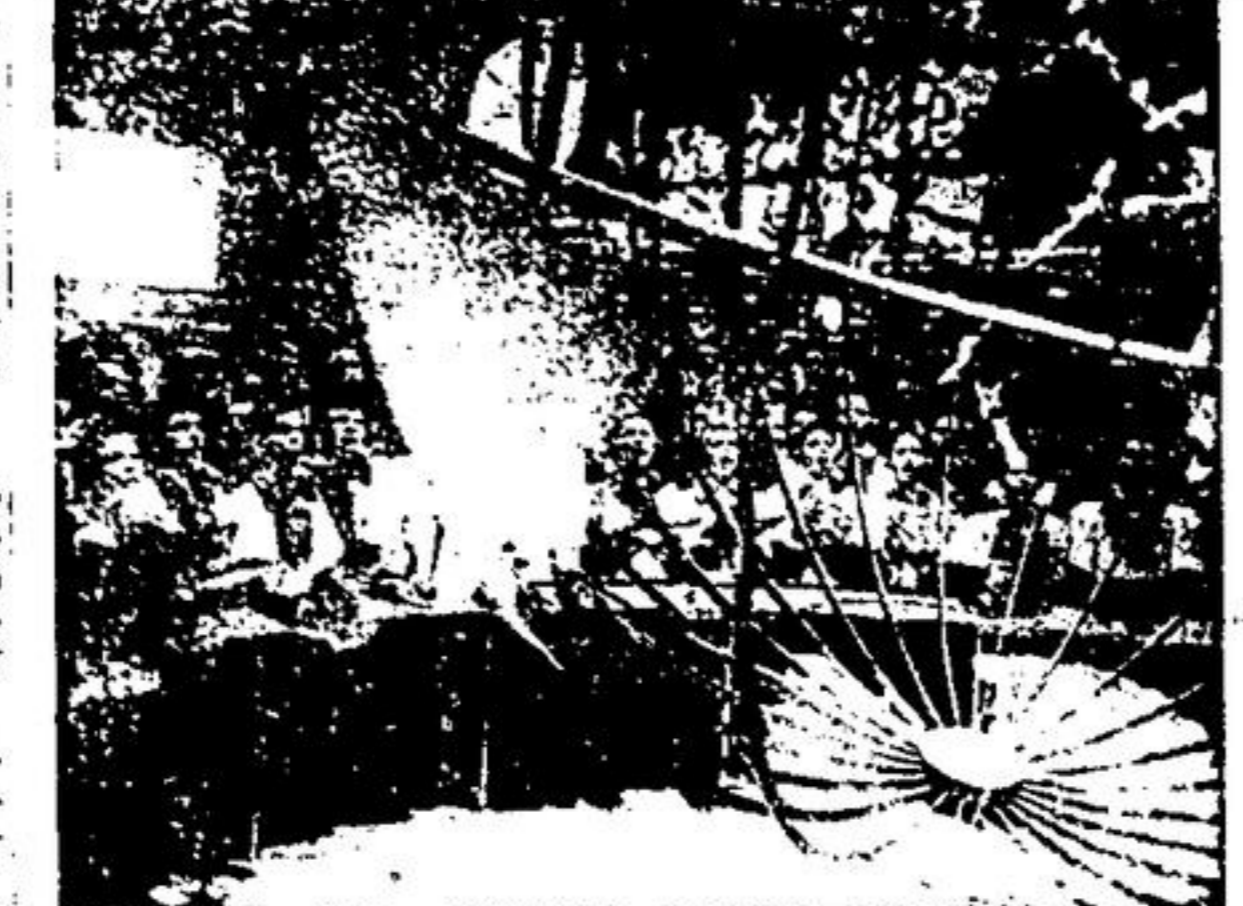
Pallbearers were Howard Lane, Mount Dennis; Graham Tarnell, Georgetown; Robert

A note in the Church Bulletin tells of St. Stephen's Day, Dec. 26th and St. John's Day, Dec. 27th:

St. Stephen was the first Christian martyr. He was stoned to death at the hands of a Jerusalem mob. At the time of his death he was a young man. His heroism, and the circumstances of his death led to the conversion of another young man, Saul of Tarsus, who later became the Apostle Paul. St. John was one of the twelve

apostles, possibly the only one to live to a good age and die a natural death. He became the Bishop of Ephesus and died at about ninety years of age. It is unusual that our two Churches should be named after these Saints whose commemorative days come so close in the church calendar.
