Police Warn Merchants To Watch for Pilfering

Chief constable Roy Haley has asked the Herald to relay a warning to town merchants that they can expect increased shoplifting over Christmas.

Chief Haley explained that experience has shown an increase in shoplifting and thievery at this time of the year.

The warning says that dishonest employees who ring fraudulent transactions or deliver merchandise to a confederate are a source of loss.

Chief Haley disclosed that merchants in the concentrated shopping areas are the ones most frequently victimized and most merchants suffer the losses by not taking adequate precautions.

Watch Front Offices

He warned about unauthorized persons being allowed to wander through offices or using excuses for being on the premises and added that front offices left unattended and with women's purses on or near the desks presented an opportunity for quick and easy thefts.

Stock boxes and merchandise are left unguarded on the streets or loading dock, said the chief. Fully loaded and unguarded trucks with keys in the ignition are also an invitation to thievery.

Merchants are warned not to keep too much cash on hand and that those taking deposits to the bank should do so at irregular times.
