Spontaneous sounds of laughter and hearty rounds of applause were heard in the auditorium on Saturday evening, December 16th when Mrs. Joyce Davidson of Acton brought ten performers to the Manor to entertain the residents with a variety program.

Mr. Jack Carpenter acted as an emcee, giving out information on the evening's program. Mrs. Margaret Collier played all the piano accompaniment and Mr. Leslie played the violin for several selections. Nearly all the performers came from Acton.

Several children showed great talent in song and dance numbers and at the same time delighted the eyes of the spectators with their very lovely costumes. The children who danced and sang were Sharon and Peter who sang "Swanee" by Debbie and Diane who sang "Wonderland" by Mrs. Carpenter, Sandra Brine and Terese Brine sang "Soldier Boy" by Sandra Brine, a clever acrobatic dance was done by Mrs. V. Their singing was conducted by Mrs. C. Mitchell and the piano accompaniment was played by Mrs. H. J. Darton.

Mrs. H. J. Darton, Mrs. H. Johnston was chairman. The visitors sang ten carols in very lovely fashion and their musical treat presented for the residents was greatly appreciated. It was regretted that owing to an engagement made prior to their coming to the Manor they could not stay for a social hour when Mrs. S. Allen, Mrs. Frank Martin and a number of young girls served cold drinks and cookies.

A highlight of the Christmas season at the Manor, the residents' annual Christmas party around the Christmas tree, was held in the auditorium on Wednesday night, December 20th. At the beginning of the Christmas season the auditorium had been decorated with bells, wreaths and festoons, and a Christmas tree, decorated with lights, placed in a corner.

While the large audience of residents was assembling, Miss M. Springer of the nursing staff played carols on the electric organ which had been moved

to the auditorium from its usual place in the Chapel. When everyone had taken their seats, Mrs. Walter Bell, a member of the Auxiliary, announced in very capable fashion the various numbers of an enjoyable and interesting program.

The first number was a group of four songs presented by nine little boys and girls who belong to the Sunday School of Knox Presbyterian Church in Milton. Mrs. R. Wright was the accompanist for the songs and for instrumental selections on the program. Later in the program these same boys and girls sang three more songs. Two songs among the seven sung were "Little Christmas Candle" and "Up on the Hour-You".

Little Raymond Wright who is only three years old, sang two solos, one of which is the traditional theme song of the Manor, "Bless This House". A solo by Margaret Bell, in which she recalled the words "Christmas is very interesting."

Two gentlemen sang solos. Mr. Ted Price sang "O Holy Night" and "A Star Was Born" and Mr. Walter Bell sang "The Road to the Isles" and "Belong to Glasgow". A trio of young girls, Andrea Cunnella, Susan and Marilyn Martin, dressed in pretty Highland costumes, danced two Scottish dances and later in the program they changed to Irish costumes to dance an Irish jig to the music of "The Irish Washerwoman".

Pension Plan Hits Snag in County

Halton County's proposed new pension plan for county employees has been temporarily delayed, Standard Life Assurance Co representative Lloyd East told county councilors at last week's Dec. meeting. Roads department and health unit employees have protested joining it.

The plan was originally sought to replace a government annuities program that did not suit some of the senior employees. When all county employees voted on the plan, a majority vote approved. However, since then the health and roads employees, protesting they should have voted as groups, not with the administration office and manor employees.

Mr. East suggested council could proceed with plans to include administration and manor staffs in the plan, and in the meantime the company would be meeting with those objecting to the scheme.

Two Injured in Pond Road Collision
