

Luckless Sailors are Downed by Raiders

Spaath-headed by Fraser Dunn's hat trick, Georgetown's Intermediate A Raiders indulged in a little carpet-bombing in Port Credit last Wednesday night and improved their win-loss record to an impressive 9-4.

Missing the last place Sailors for the second time this campaign the Raiders whopped the league doormats 9-0, scoring once in the first period and then bombing the home club with four goals in each of the second and third frames.

It was the Sailors' 13th setback in 14 games.

Barry Smith, of the goaltending Smiths, chalked up the shutout, and had to be sharp to do it, but if there was such a thing as an assist for white washes, one would have to go to Raider rearguard Wally Magdy who got in the way of almost as many shots as Smith. Port Credit's best threats however, a pair of clean cut breakaways, were dashed by the ex-Guelph Billmore goalie.

Dave Irons' marker at 12:21 from Doug Richardson and Wayne Thompson stood up for the rest of the period as Raiders managed a shakey one goal advantage going into the middle stanza.

Fraser Dunn punched in the first of his trio from Demers at 2:13 and Jerry Inglis after 7 minutes and 38 seconds had gone by in the second period, and with the game half gone, Doug Richardson completed a three-cornered play involving Junior Beaumont and Blake Inglis.

When he pulled the Port Credit goalie to the front of his crease and dumped in the Raiders' third counter, Blake Inglis added to the rapidly inflating bulge with a solo effort with a shot from directly in front of the net which found an open corner, and Max Galand needed no assistance on his tally from close in, less than a minute later.

Smith's shutout became more and more the Raider goal in the third session but the red-carbed marksmen didn't let up in their shelling of the P.C. cage. Joe Auger led defense-

man Gord Thompson with the pass that resulted in Georgetown's fifth score at the 1:30 mark, and Galand and Demers clicked at the 5 minutes even with Galand on the scoring end. Then Dunn exploded for his second and third goals to cap the scoring. The first of the pair was a long, low one that fooled the Sailor goalie, at 10:30 Joe Auger picking up the assist, and the second was from in close. The puck skipped from Demers to Blake Inglis to 4:50 Dunn, and the ex-Bradford sniper coasted right in goal before triggering the bullet.

Georgetown outshot the port town 51 to 36.

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
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
