Bob Bonfield was elected by acclamation to a third term as Georgetown's fire chief when members of the fire department held their annual meeting Sunday afternoon in the fire hall. Erwin Lewis was also acclaimed deputy chief for another year.

DIVERSITY OF ACTIVITY

In a review of the year past, Mr. Bonfield revealed a diversity of activity for the 25-member department. In addition to their assigned task of firefighting, the department was active in promoting fire prevention measures. Included in this was an open house at the fire hall, and a competition among school children to encourage parents to attend. Harrison School will be presented with a plaque for having the highest attendance. Participation in the Santa Claus parade, inspection of business premises and suggestions for fire precautions were among other department activities.

For the elections, retiring Mayor Hyde and Cr. Wm. F. Hunter were asked to take the chair. Youthship runner Wilfrid Bird and Harry Savings, a former fire chief, acted as scrutineers.

The offices of secretary and treasurer were unfilled, when nominees Clarence Spence and Gordon Inglis declined to stand for election. They will continue in office for the next month and another election will be called.
