PARKS & RECREATION:

In Bellefontaine Park much of the stonework was repaired and at present the retaining wall and spillway sections of the dam, as well as the swing bridge abutments, are being rebuilt. In Terra Cotta the camping area was extended to 42 tent sites, and public facilities were also extended. At Esplanade the river channel was altered at a cost of \$39,000 to prevent flooding and make more land available for future recreation development.

LAND USE:

The Advisory Board assisted in the construction of eleven farm ponds and gave technical advice on many other ponds. The Authority has created land to date is 61.

REFORESTATION:

The Authority planted the largest number of trees in its history during the planting season of '61. A total of 182,775 trees were planted.

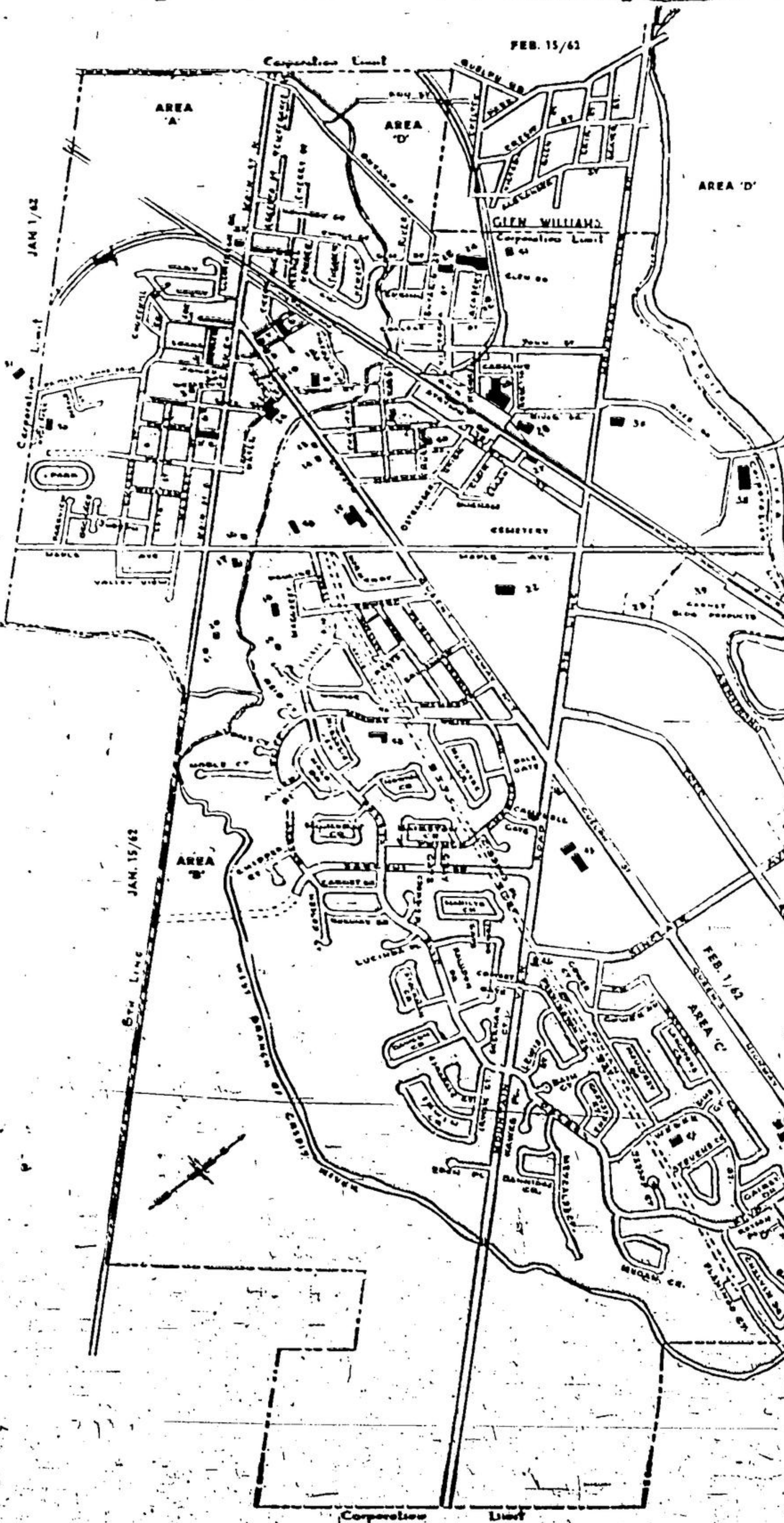

NOTICE Hydro-Electric Complete Billing Dates



JANUARY 1st, 1962 - AREA 'A':
Billed regular 2 month period. North Westerly side of Main St. on Park side. South Westerly side of Main St. from Guelph St. South Westerly side of Guelph St. from Main St. N. to Maple Ave. W. GLEN WILLIAMS was also billed 2 month period.

JANUARY 15th, 1962 - AREA 'B':
Will be billed 2 1/2 month period - this billing ONLY and thereafter 2 month billing. South Westerly side of Guelph St. from Maple Ave. W. to Sinclair Ave. Residences on Guelph St. only, north easterly side, Mountainview Road to Easterly limits. South Easterly side of Main St. S. and 8th line between Maple Ave. W. and Sargent Road. Both sides Sargent Road.

FEBRUARY 1st, 1962 - AREA 'C':
Will be billed 3 month period - this billing ONLY and thereafter 2 month billing. South Westerly side of Guelph St. Sinclair Ave. to Easterly limits. This Area 'C' provides for future development beyond Sargent Road.

FEBRUARY 15th, 1962 - AREA 'D':
Will be billed 2 1/2 month period - this billing ONLY and thereafter regular 2 month billing. Easterly side of Main St. North commencing at Guelph St. and North-Easterly side of Guelph St. from Main St. North to Credit River.

AREA 'D':
Glen Williams will be billed 1 1/2 month period, one billing ONLY, and thereafter regular 2 month billing.

COMMERCIAL AND POWER accounts are still being billed on first of every month.

March 1st, 1962, March 15th, April 1st and April 15th, 1962, will all cover regular two-month billings as heretofore and will continue to be billed on regular two month billings.

Prompt payment Discount Dates will be 10 days after respective billing dates.

Customers are reminded that services unpaid 15 days after the last discount date will be discontinued according to regulations.
