Postmaster Harold Marshall told the Herald this week that the Georgetown Post Office processed approximately 500,000 cards and parcels during the Christmas rush. The figures have just been compiled.

Mr. Marshall said the post office staff worked very hard to get the mail out on time. The Christmas build-up began about the 9th of December and dropped off sharply around the 21st. The peak day was the 14th.

Mr. Marshall said the number of items which come in bearing incomplete addresses averaged 2,000 per day. The post office staff managed to get most of them to their destinations with a minimum of delay. Mr. Marshall said the problem was not out of town mail, but out of town mailers and would probably never be overcome.

As a result of the early mailing cooperation of the public, all mail cleared the local office well in advance of the Christmas deadline.

For the first time in history the local office staff were allowed to take the Boxing Day holiday.

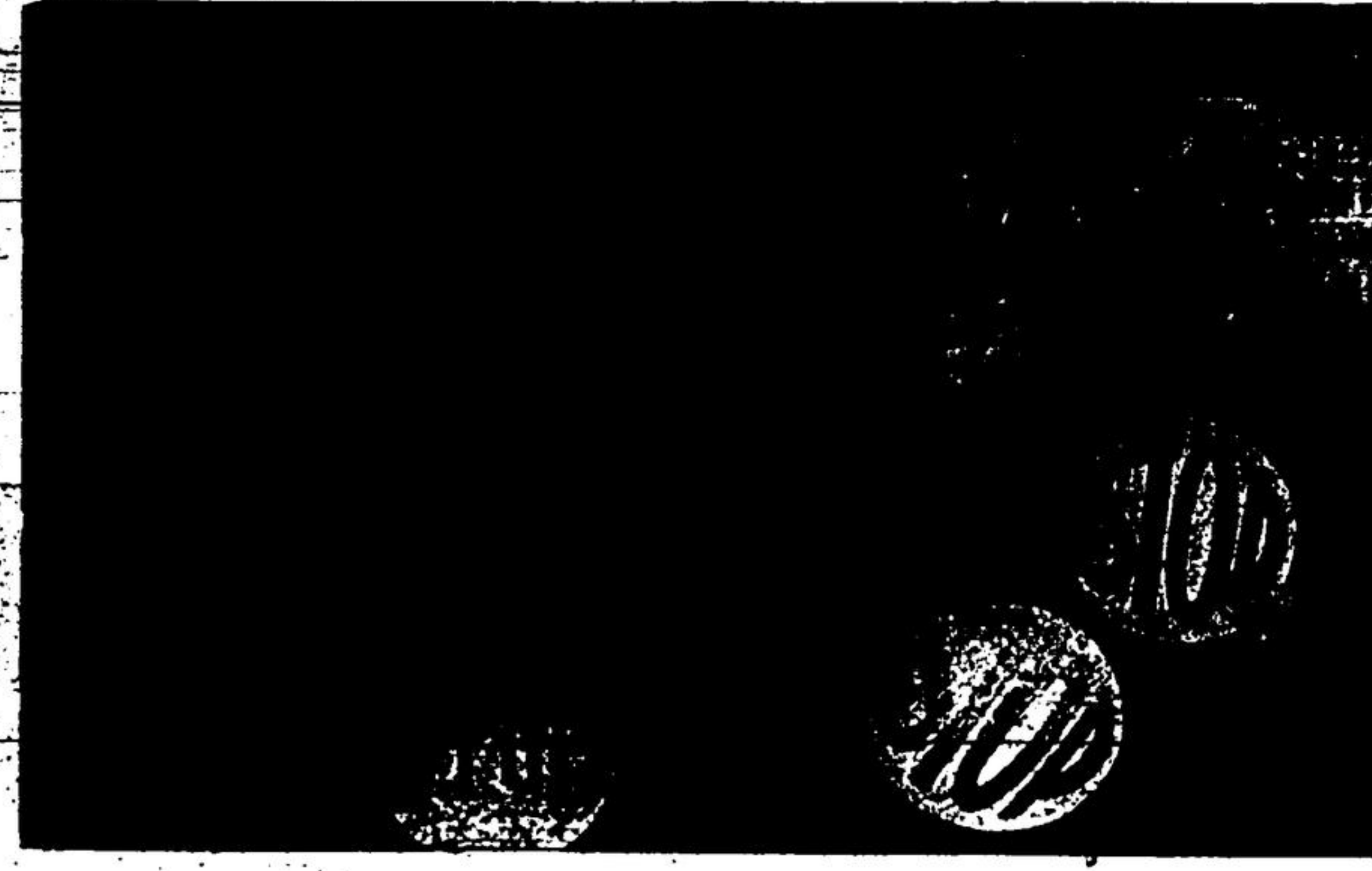
