At the age of 100, John Graff, R.R. 2, Acton, the father of Edward Graff and Mrs. Frank Connely, Mrs. Fred Anthony and Mrs. Thelma Heelan of town died on Tuesday December 28th after an extended illness. Funeral service was held on Friday, December 29th at the Rumley Shoemaker funeral home conducted by Charles Beaton and interment was in the family plot at Churchill, Pennsylvania Dutch.
