School Shift Angers Sargent Road Residents

Want New School and Not Kennedy Addition

A delegation of residents of the Sargent Road area are planning to attend the next public school board meeting to express objection to a pupil-shift from Harrison to Kennedy school.

Visiting council Monday, the group with Mrs. Ken Ewles as spokesman, asked why original plans for a new school in the Sargent Road vicinity had not been proceeded with, while the council would release land in the unleased Delrex area for such a school and if land could be expropriated for such a school.

At present, the school board is engaged in planning an addition to Kennedy School and has dropped plans for a sixth school. Last year council would not agree to the site chosen, and the board would not agree to an alternative site, which forced adoption of the addition plan.

Mayor Sargent explained that while council has some involvement with school matters, the delegation should more properly discuss their problems with the school board. Deputy Reeve, Hunter and Cr. Emmerson maintained that council's choice was only a short distance from the board selection, and Cr. Emmerson estimated a \$750,000 cost in servicing if this had been used.

"Personally I feel two more school sites will eventually be needed," said the deputy reeve. "Planning in the first place was not too good because Harrison School is overcrowded now, and I'm quite in favour of building a new school behind Sargent Road."

As for releasing land in an unleased area, Mayor Sargent said this might be a question this year's council would be faced with, but it is a complex one and he could pass no opinion at present.

Council has expropriation powers for school sites, he said, in answering one of the questions.

Mrs. Ewles said children would be tired after a long walk to school if the present plan is proceeded with. Another member of the group expressed concern that the problem would be of long duration, as a seven room addition is being planned, and as the western part of town grows, there would be a constant eastern pupil shift toward Kennedy School.

WHAY COUNCIL DID Wilson Resigns Planning Board

Resigning from the town planning board because of the pressure of other activities, Ed-wil Wilson was replaced by counsel on Monday with Harold Baird.

Mr. Wilson has served on the board since its inception, including a term as chairman, and regret was expressed at his departure.

Mr. Baird, whose term on the board expired at the year end was replaced last week by former mayor Fern Hyde.

When Cr. McNelly termed last week's replacement of Mr. Baird as "uncourteous and degrading" Deputy Reeve Hunter said a typical motion with a blank name to be filled in had passed around the table and had no name filled in when it reached him at the end of the line.

"I had my name on it nominating Mr. Baird," said Cr. McNelly.

"That's an accusation and I want the motion produced," replied Mr. Hunter.

Cr. Cook, who had the deputy reeve, nominated Mr. Hyde for the post, said he had made the nomination in good faith and that he would control his actions as he saw fit, not be bound by accepted practices of previous councils.

"I didn't know Mr. Baird was a candidate and I had no intention of stirring him or anyone else," he said.

Cr. Harrison said he agreed with Cr. Cook and that automatic reappointments should not be the rule.

"I am convinced I made a motion but there were so many passing around the table I might be confused," said Cr. McNelly.

At this point the disputed motion was produced and Cr. McNelly apologized for his statement.

"It was my intention to move it and even though I voted for Mr. Hyde I think council should have considered Mr. Baird," he said.

Ponder Appointments Industrial Commission

Appointment of the 1962 Industrial Commission has occupied a large share of the first two town council meetings, and opinions differ on the composition of the commission.

Last year's 10 member commission included four councillors, four appointees of the Chamber of Commerce and two of the Jaycees.

This year it would appear that council representation might be cut to two, and whether council will choose its own appointment staff or accept advice from the Chambers seemed to be in doubt on Monday.

Three Motions

At that meeting three motions were placed in the mayor's hands, but he suggested that the movers defer them. Only one was discussed, this by Cr. McNelly containing ten names of men whom he said he had personally interviewed and each signified his willingness to serve. All were representatives of business.

Cr. Emmerson said the reeve and deputy had been very active members and should be included in the 1962 commission. Reeve Elliott thought members of council's industrial committee should also be included.

Mayor Sargent reminded council that before any appointments are made decision should be taken on how the commission is to be constituted. It is important that some members be able to take time in the day when necessary, but he thinks they might be able to contribute even though not always available during business hours.

"It's unfortunate that we haven't the money for a professional organizer, for that is the answer to our problem, and I'm quite in favour of giving this a try," said Cr. Barrager.

Cr. Hunter said council should not take one man's word that the names submitted would all serve and his suggestion that the motion be held a week was accepted.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

On the previous Thursday a motion that two councillors and the mayor be commission members was made by McNelly and Harrison and later withdrawn for more consideration.

At the time Cr. Barrager said he would recommend Cr. McNelly for an appointment.

"He was very active last year and with the knowledge he has gained he should be a great asset," said Cr. Barrager.

Cr. McNelly indicated that he would decline membership as town administration would be taking the bulk of his time.

Deputy Reeve Hunter said he had donated much time to commission work last year, but some others had only sat in on meetings and wouldn't make trips to the city to talk to prospects.

Sanded Sidewalks In 1962 Street Program

Sidewalks will be sanded in icy weather this year promised Cr. Fred Harrison, council's new road chairman, when he spoke Thursday at the town council meeting.

Cr. Harrison criticized not weighing sand bought for winter road work.

"As road chairman I won't okay any bills for sand which is measured in yards and charged by the ton," he said.

The road chairman expressed concern over sewage from the proposed Moore Park subdivision which will be channelled into a sewer line which he claims is already running to capacity.

He also enquired about the town's position with the contractor in a sewer laid in the hospital area into which surface drainage has been seeping and enquired about the town's position in making repairs.

He ended his remarks with criticism of proposed gates at the town park entrance from Harold Street being replaced by posts.

"The gates were ordered a year ago by motion and the motion should have been reconsidered for a change in plan," he charged.

As a Unit
Reeve Elliott stressed that the commission must work as a unit and that it is not good if some members divulge premature information to the public.

Deputy Reeve Hunter's experience on the local and county industrial commissions should be valuable to the town, he said.

"Cr. Barrager worked on the commission too, last year," added the deputy reeve.
