Numbers Increase In Federal Civil Service

OTTAWA (Special to The Herald) — Canada's federal civil service continues to expand in numbers and in cost. And, while this is taking place, the Royal Commission on Government Organization is continuing its work. Known as the Glasco commission after its chairman, J. Grant Glasco, it made its first report in May of this year. The commission was established by an order-in-council of September 18th, 1960, with the purpose of enquiring into and reporting upon the organization and methods of the departments and agencies of the government and to make recommendations concerning the matters specifically set forth in its terms of reference. In particular, the commission was asked to report on such matters as eliminating duplication and overlapping of services, eliminating unnecessary or uneconomic operations, achieving efficiency or economy through reallocation or regrouping of units of the public service.

Mother Of Local Lady Dies Overseas

Mrs. Agnes Gzieskowiak, 82, who died in France on January 14th, was the mother of a local resident, Mrs. Jean Cummins. Mrs. Cummins last saw her mother two years ago when she made a trip home. Mrs. Gzieskowiak, who was a native of Poznan, Poland, had lived for 30 years in Lievin, Pas de Calais, near Vimy Ridge. Prior to that the family lived in Oberhausen, Germany. Besides her daughter here, she leaves one daughter in France, two daughters in Poland and one son in France.

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HOSPITAL NEWS

Under the laws of the Province in which we live every company or Corporation must periodically report to the persons who actually are its owners. The report must show in every required detail the results of the operation from the time of the last previous report. This is part and parcel of the Companies Act and various regulations thereunder.

Hospitals too are incorporated and registered under parts of the Companies Act but with more detailed spelling out of requirements through the controls set forth in the Ontario Hospitals Act. The reason for the additional spelling out of detail being that matters of health as well as education are a provincial matter under the terms of the BNA Act and therefore must comply with some over-riding federal statutes. Since the advent of Canada wide Federal, Provincial, agreements for hospital care there has been added areas of mutual interest to both governments.

The current Hospitals' Act states that every registered hospital must be managed and directed by an elected board of Directors who manage the hospital for all persons in the hospital's community who belong to the Hospital Association. There must be an annual meeting of the Association between 1st January and 30th April of each year at which the directors report on the previous year's activities, this year ending on 31st December of each year. At this annual meeting too any new directors required are elected from the members of the association. This is the mode of operation, of course, of every company or corporation in the country and is accepted as the best means of ensuring continuity of operation with the best interest of all being served.
