Harness Racing Track Is Planned at Campbellville

The ultimate construction of a night harness racing track at Campbellville, at an estimated cost of \$3,000,000, was announced last week by officials of the Jockey Club Ltd., Toronto. Plans call for the opening of the Campbellville raceway in 1963, including a five-furlong racing strip, stabling for 600 horses, living quarters for 200 employees, a grandstand seating 3,000 with a glass-enclosed terrace dining room overlooking the racing strip, and an eventual parking area for 10,000 cars.

While it was not mentioned in Jockey Club president E. P. Taylor's announcement, it is expected the track will be able to obtain liquor facilities. The residents of Nassagaweya last September approved cocktail lounges and beer outlets by a large majority vote. Wolfgang von Richthofen of Hallowville, who owns, trains thoroughbreds and breeds standardbreds, has been named a director of the Jockey Club. Mr. Richthofen has been promoting the track for the past year and it is understood he has a financial interest in the site of the track.

Brampton Funeral for Mrs. Edgar Ireland

Funeral service for Mrs. Jean Ireland, Inglewood, was held from McKillop's Funeral Home on January 5th. Mrs. Ireland died in the Dufferin Area Hospital, Orangeville, on January 3rd in her 62nd year.

The addition of the Campbellville track and another announced for St. Catharines will launch the Central Ontario Racing Circuit of four tracks, with a minimum of 200 nights of racing. He added that the ideal racing situation would be spring and fall meets at each of the four tracks with each meet of 21 and 28 days duration.

Wolfe Chairman Red Cross Campaign

2,000 Tons Sand Salt and 46 Miles of Streets

Georgetown works department may use up close to 2,000 tons of sand and salt to combat ice on town streets this winter, town engineer Geoff Bligh said this week. The department has about 600 tons of sand, 100 tons of salt and 50 tons of calcium stockpiled, and have already used 600 tons. If the weather is severe, the estimate will be short.

Last winter was reasonably normal and so far this year it has been fairly light, said Mr. Bligh. "Ice storms are those that bite into the supply." Calcium is used at lower temperatures but because it's so expensive, sand and salt are used whenever possible. The work staff are on call around the clock and do their road clearing work with a fleet composed of a plow, a grader, a loader, one town truck, and rented trucks as required. The works staff work in close co-operation with the police who usually give them the nod when roads start to get slippery. Georgetown has 46 miles of streets and all of them have to be sanded when conditions get very bad.

Commenting on the difference centre street lighting has made in snow removal, the town engineer said, "We like it. It is much easier. The men don't have to get up in the middle of the night to haul the snow away immediately since it can be plowed into the centre and left until morning. What's more, it means only one long snowbank to load on the trucks, instead of down each side of the street."
