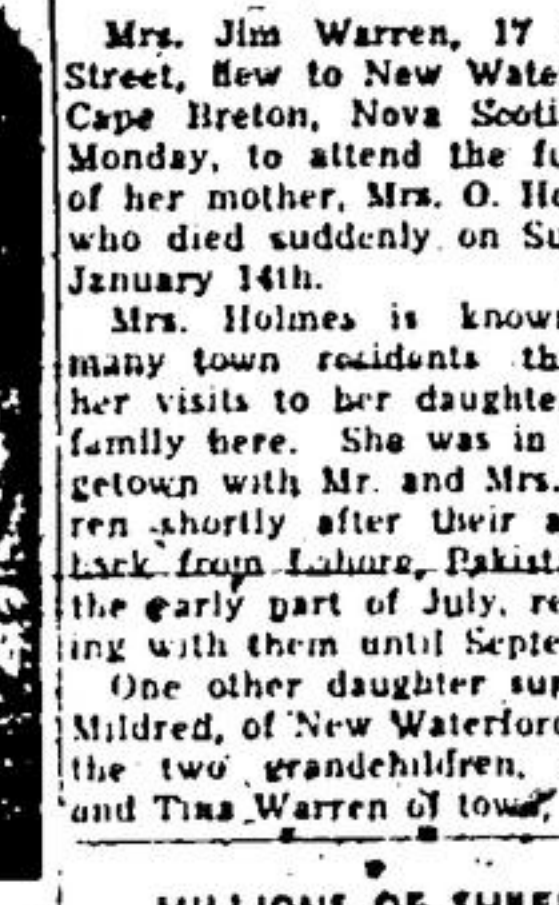

## "Up Year" is Forecast by Chamber of Commerce

Canadians can look forward to a relatively good year in 1962. President W. S. Kirkpatrick of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce said in a year-end message.

He warned, however, that while there has been some improvement in business conditions, there are no grounds for complacency.

"On the contrary," he said, "Canada must adjust to rapidly changing conditions at home and abroad and be prepared to face up to difficulties that lie ahead. We don't want just a temporary surge forward, but rather we must make sound preparations for a period of sustained growth."

The Canadian Chamber President said Canada's major problem is that of establishing a growth rate sufficient to provide productive and satisfying jobs for a rapidly expanding labour force.
