Halton Baseball League

The executive of the Halton County Baseball Assn. met Wednesday night in a regular meeting to deal with the past season's position.

An application for a Guelph entry in the Intermediate series was studied and the team will be accepted for the 1962 season, providing league qualifications can be met in time. At present seven teams make up the league with Milton Red Sox, Campbellville Merchants, Acton Merchants, Bronte Braves, Oakville Oaks, Dundas Athletics, and Georgetown making up the fold. The Georgetown entry was new in 1951 but had taken a major part in the league some eight years before.

President Peter McMullen stated he had been contacted by a member of Guelph executive earlier this year regarding possible entering the league and he president at that time informed the chap of the Jamboree meeting.
