POLITICAL EXCITEMENT has been heightened in recent days by the Provincial By-Elections and the Throne Speech in the opening of Parliament. Some times it is said that the press and various news agencies are to have more definite ideas about the timing of an election than do the voters. Suffice to say that election fever will rise and fall many times before the actual event takes place.

THE THRONE SPEECH, while relatively brief, indicated a wide variety of measures to come before the House of Commons in the days ahead. The detailed nature of each measure will only be apparent, however, when the specific Bills are presented to the House, one by one. Undoubtedly, many of these measures will closely affect us, our friends and neighbours, and the municipalities in which we live. Towns in Halton county have taken advantage of the Government's municipal winter works plan in dozens of instances, and this programme is to be enlarged and broadened in the nearby future, thereby creating greater employment in the winter months.

Stimulation of business activity by Government action is to be continued. Past measures which have assisted Canadian companies in increasing their exports, will be enlarged through additional financing. The scope of the Small Business Loans Act is to be considerably broadened. This assistance has been widely used by many businesses across Canada.

A number of the plans read into the record by the Governor-General, will call for close Provincial co-operation. Discussion will take place with the Provinces, regarding contributory old-age pensions; an
