A man who will contest Eglinton riding with Finance Minister Fleming in the next federal election was goal speaker when Halton Liberals held their annual meeting in Milton Friday.

Marshall Sharp, Canada's former deputy minister of trade and commerce, said he believes Mr. Fleming is responsible for the worst mistakes of the Dielenker government and would like to challenge him in his constituency in a democratic manner.

Federal Liberal candidate Dr. Harry Harby was also on the speaking platform during the evening.

Cherry Street Fire Threatens Children

Father, Police Chief Save Tots in Blaze

A Cherry Street resident, Ray Payne, was taken to Georgetown hospital and treated for burns to his hands and legs after a flash fire erupted in his three children from their four room house on Thursday night.

Fire Chief Bob Bonfield estimated \$1,500 damage to the house and \$1,200 to the furniture, much of it from water and smoke.

The loss could have been measured in human lives, but for the quick thinking of the children's grandfather, Police Chief Roy Haley and Mr. Payne. When he discovered they were trapped inside the blazing home, Chief Haley dashed into the flames, snatched up two of the children, Barry, 6, and Kevin, 3, and carried them outside. The heat was too great to make another attempt.

Knocked Out Window — Inside, Mr. Payne smashed out a bedroom window, pushed 8 year old Guy through, and then scrambled through himself suffering glass cuts in the process.

Chief Bonfield said the fire started around the floor in the kitchen, immediately blocking off the only avenue of escape. Origin was not determined.

Fire damage was mainly to the kitchen, floors, walls, ceiling and cupboards, an annex of the kitchen, a refrigerator and an electric stove. All the walls in the house and furniture were blackened by the smoke.

Chief Haley's son Bob turned in the alarm at 9 o'clock, and the firemen, who were holding a meeting at the fire hall, were on the scene in a couple of minutes.

Chief Haley said that it was the first Thursday evening in some time that he hadn't been out of town at the Anglers and Hunters meeting.
