Efforts Needed to Keep Trade Growing

Higher Exports To U.K., Europe Benefit Canada

Pulpwood harvested by farmers, other woodlot owners, and the pulp and paper companies, and afterwards converted into pulp, paper, and paperboard, is moving overseas in increasing amounts this year.

In the form of Canadian newsprint, it brings the news of the day to readers in London, Edinburgh, and many other cities and towns in the United Kingdom. As Canadian newsprint is one of the raw materials for hundreds of European products, from German magazines to Italian mill bolts caps, and from Belgian books to Dutch cardboard boxes.

The trade is already important - and growing. Last year, Canadian shipments of pulp and paper to Britain and Western Europe totalled some \$125 million. In terms of volume, this was the equivalent of about 1 1/2 million cords of pulpwood.

The economies of Western Europe continue to grow rapidly, and economic growth always means increased demand for pulp and paper. Recent estimates of paper and paperboard consumption, made by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, forecast that the U.K. and Western Europe will be using 30 million

tons of these products by 1975, compared with only 20 million tons in 1955. Canada hopes to share in this increased demand. If she does, the benefits, in the form of more jobs, larger payrolls, increased purchases of pulpwood,

chemicals and other supplies, of the world. Recently, the pulp and paper industry asked the Canadian government to seek to preserve this principle over the years. RABID COON ATTACKS DRIVER NEAR SCHOOL

Motorists might be well advised to carry some kind of a weapon to combat rabid animals Monday afternoon on a rural road near town, held to death a rabid coon, bound to put up a battle.

The Acton resident said he was travelling between the 3rd and 4th line in Erin Township when suddenly a coon appeared on the road in front of his vehicle. When he stopped his car to allow the animal to reach the side of the road, the coon made tracks for the vehicle. He thought at first the animal was a porcupine.

Realizing the coon was sick, he grabbed a shovel and stood in the middle of the road. When the rabid coon continued toward him intent on attacking, he beat it to death, buried it under the deep snow and on returning to Acton notified a veterinarian who agreed the animal was likely rabid.
