ROBERT BURNS (1759-1796)
Scotland's greatest poet. Startled the world with a little book of poems in 1784 which proclaimed him a true son of the muse. With the 500 pounds that his book yielded him, he bought a farm, obtained an appointment with the excise in 1789, and for the last five years of his life lived at Dumfries. In his career he poured forth song after song of emotional tenderness, and made his name immortal.
