**Plan School Building In South Esqueuing**

**Railway Crossing Protection Sought**  
 By early 1963, two new schools will be in operation in Esqueuing. School Board member Bob Cunningham informed Esqueuing Council, Monday night.  
 It is hoped to begin construction on the Umehouse school in April of this year, and to have it completed by September. The estimated cost is \$120,000.  
 In addition, School Trustee Bill Lawson told council they were planning in building a school in the south end of the township, which would be open early in 1963, if all approvals were obtained. The cost of this one would be approximately the same as the Umehouse one.  
 "There's no protection at any of these crossings," Councillor G. Currie stated when looking at the plans for double tracking work for their relief, he also the CNR tracks from Milton gated, leaving municipalities free to do so.  
 "The railway won't do anything unless they have to," he continued, "and I think we should try to force them."  
 As a result of this discussion a motion was passed that the Board of Transport be notified that Esqueuing Council request the CNR to install and maintain protection on all crossings in Milton subdivision where double track is being installed.

**WHY COUNCIL DID Councillor Queries Street Sand Purchase**

"Last week I mentioned street sanding," said Deputy Reeve Hunter at Monday's council meeting. "I didn't mean to say that I don't approve of sanding, but I thought it was being overdone in some spots. I did ask for a comparison of sanding costs, and I'd like to have a price comparison too," he added.  
 Told that the price of \$1.00 a ton is the same as last year, the deputy reeve then enquired why sand can be brought from three times as far away for the same price as paid at a closer source.  
 Road chairman Fred Harrison answered that a quote being sent for charity.  
 "Answer: No organization collecting public funds turns over as large a percentage as United Appeal. Campaign costs in Canada amount to 8 to 10%. Private groups vary from 10 to 50% and many reputable groups operate on a 25% expense budget."

 Answer: Not always, but in most cases yes.  
 Question: Is there a difference between Community Chest, United Appeal, Red Feather and other groups?  
 Answer: United Appeal has topped the most common designations today and Red Feather is widely used as its symbol.  
 Question: If Boy Scout groups join, are they still allowed to have smaller activities like Apple Day?  
 Answer: There is sometimes criticism, and this must be solved on the local level. Member groups must agree to have no private fund campaigns, however.  
 Question: How about towns people working in the city whose firms urge them to make donations there?  
 Answer: The only thing a local group can do is to try to convince them that at least a portion should go to local appeal. It is a difficult problem.  
 Question: What is the best collection month?  
 Answer: October is a general favourite. A local group can get extra publicity through national Red Feather advertising during that month.  
 Question: Of money collected, how much is the eventual amount for charity?  
 Answer: No organization collecting public funds turns over as large a percentage as United Appeal. Campaign costs in Canada amount to 8 to 10%. Private groups vary from 10 to 50% and many reputable groups operate on a 25% expense budget.
