Mrs. Roy K. McMillan, of Georgetown, who is a member of the Toronto township council and a leading figure in conservation activities in the Credit Valley for several years, succeeds H. A. Greenaway, of Port Credit, as E.V.C.A. chairman. Mr. Greenaway had been chairman since 1957 and continues on the executive as past chairman.

Eric White, of Mono Township, was elected vice chairman and W. Elmer Wright, Port Credit, reappointed secretary-treasurer.

Spearin of the Ontario Dept. of Lands and Forests continues as field officer, and Hugh Newton, Long Pecks, was reappointed public relations officer.

The Conservation Authority is engaged in the preservation of 214,000 acres.

OAC Professor was Soil Study Engineer

Professor Norman J. Thomas who retired last year from the chemistry department of Ontario Agricultural College, in Guelph, died on January 31st in the Guelph Hospital, Hamilton.

Professor Thomas pioneered the study of soil science and its application to Ontario farmers. He was associated with the pasteurization of milk.

He sought his advice in the soil study. He had been sought by farmers throughout western Canada. He was a member of the Ontario Farmers' Union and helped to organize it in 1956 to attend the World Grass Land Conference in New Zealand.

He came to Canada from England in 1908 and following graduation from OAC in 1923 he was appointed to the chemistry department staff. He received a Master's degree in soil microbiology and chemistry from Rutgers University in 1928. After his retirement from teaching he had been employed with the Cyanamid Company.

While he was with the company he was particularly interested in the relation of beef cattle production to soil fertility. He had a definite appreciation of the significance of pasture in the economy of agricultural production.

He leaves his wife, Marie, nee Henderson, who is a daughter of Mrs. George Hender of St. Catharines, a son, Hugh, of Hamilton and two daughters, Barbara and Alison of Guelph.

Funeral services on February 3rd took place in the Memorial Hall, OAC and interment was in Woodlawn Cemetery, Guelph.

Cheaper Financing Aim Of Councilors

There's a large amount of money involved and it certainly can't come from current revenue," said C. Fred Harrison when he told council Monday that the road committee is considering improvements on No. 7 Highway from the eastern town limits to Durham St.

Mr. Harrison said he is investigating whether the town could make a short term loan to get a highway program under way, then pay it off as the progress payments are made on the government's 75% share.

Finance Chairman Bob McNelly said he had been in touch with a stockbroker and that if such a thing could be negotiated it would save the town as much as \$100,000.

He passed information to council around the table, with figures illustrating his point.
