Alister Blair, unassisted and Popel from Malcolm did the Georgetown scoring. Ronnie Howe scored twice and Fred James once for the Winona club.

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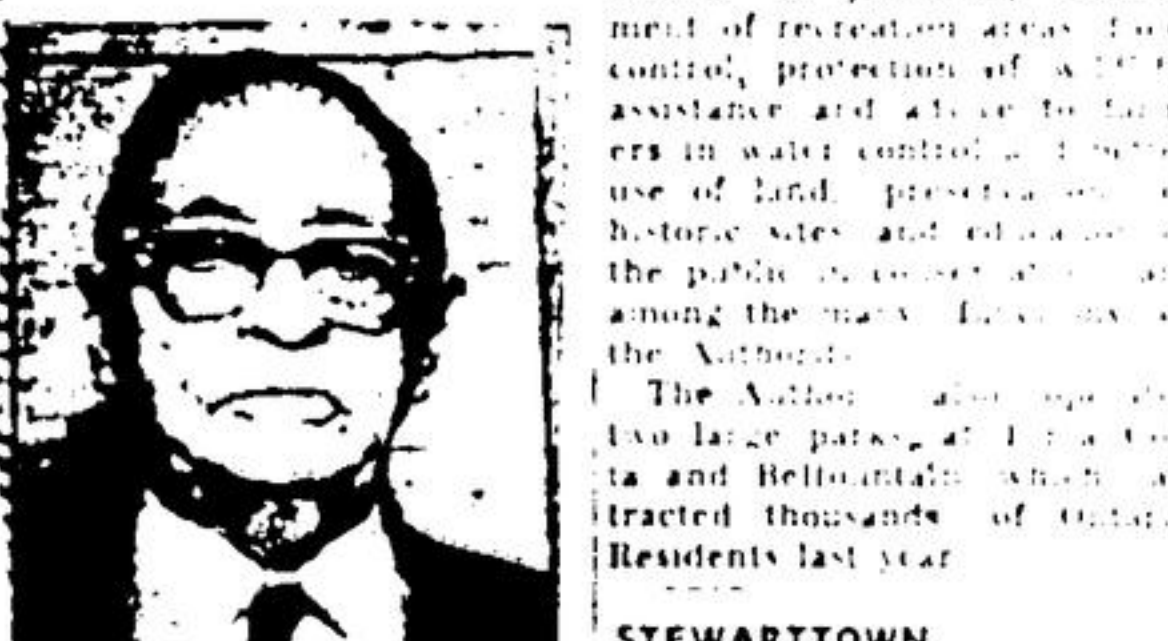
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ELECTIONS COMPLETED THURSDAY

The Authority also approved two large parcels, at 1100 and 1200, and Belmont, which attracted thousands of Ontario residents last year.

Mrs. Roy K. McMillan, of Georgetown, who is a member of the Toronto township council and a leading figure in conservation activities in the Credit Valley for several years, succeeds H. A. Greenaway, of Port Credit, as E.V.C.A. chairman. Mr. Greenaway had been chairman since 1957 and continues on the executive as past chairman.

Eric White, of Mono Township, was elected vice chairman and W. Elmer Wright, Port Credit, reappointed secretary-treasurer.

The Conservation Authority is engaged with the preservation of 214,000 acres.

OAC Professor was Soil Study Engineer

Professor Norman J. Thomas who retired last year from the chemistry department of Ontario Agricultural College, in Guelph, died on January 31st in the Guelph Hospital, Hamilton.

Professor Thomas pioneered the study of soil science and its application to Ontario farmers. He was associated with pasture improvement.

Sought His Advice
His advice on farm crop improvement had been sought by farmers throughout western Ontario. His collection of books, "Ontario Farmers' Handbook," he helped in 1956 to attend the World Grass Land Conference in New Zealand.

He came to Canada from England in 1908 and following graduation from OAC in 1923 he was appointed to the chemistry department staff. He received a Master's degree in soil microbiology and chemistry from Rutgers University in 1928.

After his retirement from teaching he had been employed with the Cyanamid Company.

While his work dealt with all types of pasture, he was particularly interested in its relation to beef cattle production.

He leaves his wife, Marie, nee Henderson, who is a daughter of Mrs. George Hender of St. Catharines, a son, Hugh, of Guelph, and two daughters, Barbara and Alison, of Guelph.

Funeral services on February 3rd took place in the Memorial Hall, OAC and interment was in Woodlawn Cemetery, Guelph.

Cheaper Financing Aim Of Councilors
