Following a turkey dinner prepared by the ladies and served by the boys and girls of the church, Rev. Fleming opened the business meeting with a period of devotion.

New Clubs

In the minister's report it was pointed out the tremendous advantage of having our own hospital as it meant a great deal less travelling for the visiting minister and left much more time for other parochial duties. During the year there were 26 baptisms, 11 marriages, and 14 deaths. 52 persons were received into membership and 13 removed for reasons of transfer, death or otherwise. Total membership now stands at 883 persons.

It was noted the new organization, the United Church Women, has been successfully launched and gives much promise of being a most effective instrument for the propagation of the Lord's work at home and abroad. Mrs. Alex Reader is the president of this organization. Also, the A.O.T.S. Club has been formed with Ken Faulkner as president and Jack Hamilton as secretary.

The club is open to all men of the congregation. The Sunday Evening Young Peoples' Group began by Dr. and Mrs. Brewster, and now under Rev. Fleming, as counsellor is continuing to grow and at present has a membership of forty.

L. B. King, the Church Treasurer, presented the financial report, indicating that giving were down a little in some sections but up in others, with a decided improvement in giving noted in the latter part of the year.
