An attractive display of cotton separates attracted many people to the William St. high school in Milton, on Saturday, Feb. 3rd. The occasion was the 4-H Homemaking Club Achievement Day, the culmination of the project for Halton County 4-H Homemaking Club members in "Separates for Summer."

In this project each club member made a set of cotton separates — skirt and top, and if they wished, a pair of Bermuda shorts. These were displayed in the morning, along with the record books containing accounts of the meeting held by each club. In the afternoon the girls modelled their separates for the large audience present for the program. As well as the parade of garments, each one of these fourteen clubs presented an exhibit or demonstration on a topic related to the project.

Peel M.P. Opposes Amendment to Bill

Ottawa (Special to the Herald) — Opposition to a private member's bill to amend the Industrial Relations and Disputes Investigation Act as it applies to the civil service, was expressed in the House of Commons recently by John Pallett, Conservative M.P. for Peel and parliamentary secretary to Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

The private bill was introduced by Frank Howard, CCF-NDP member of parliament for Skeena, B.C. Mr. Howard explained that the purpose of his bill was to make the act applicable to civil servants with one or two exceptions, notably the right to engage in a strike.

Mr. Pallett recalled that when the Liberals were in office, he had proposed at various times that certain bargaining rights might be extended to employees in certain Crown corporations, particularly in the Canadian Small Arms Corporation, one of whose plants is in his riding.

"As the result of these representations, after the administration changed, this right was extended to those employees," Mr. Pallett said. "It was generally well received by them and as recently as last fall, when I was able to go through that plant, I found the workmanship was of the same high quality as before."

He said that Mr. Howard's bill follows a general review made last year as to the legislation respecting civil servants. The matter had been thoroughly discussed at that time and legislation was dealt with by the House.

"It seems to me we ought to consider very carefully before we add hodge-podge amendments to that legislation instead of following the normal course with regards to amendments which are introduced to measures of this nature," the Peel M.P. suggested.

He said the amendment sought to place the Crown in the same position as any private employer. Over the years the Crown has come to be regarded as a more benevolent employer than most. Many had described the government as a model employer, Mr. Pallett said.

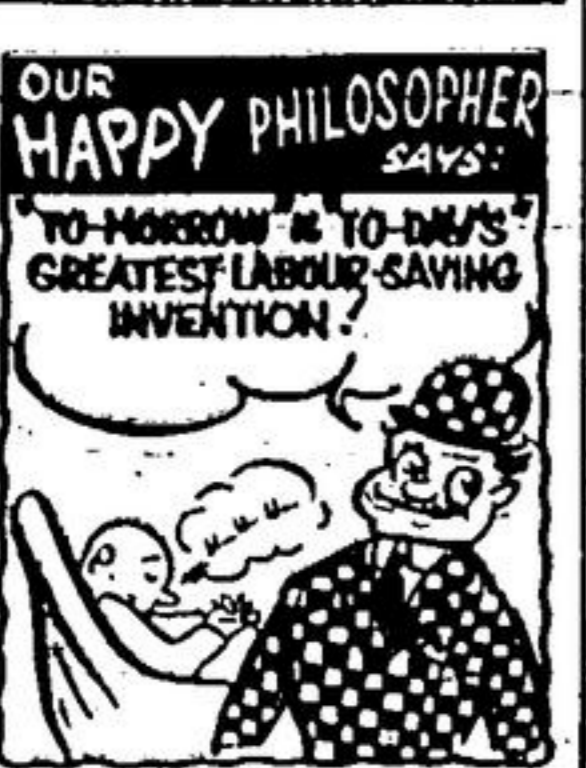

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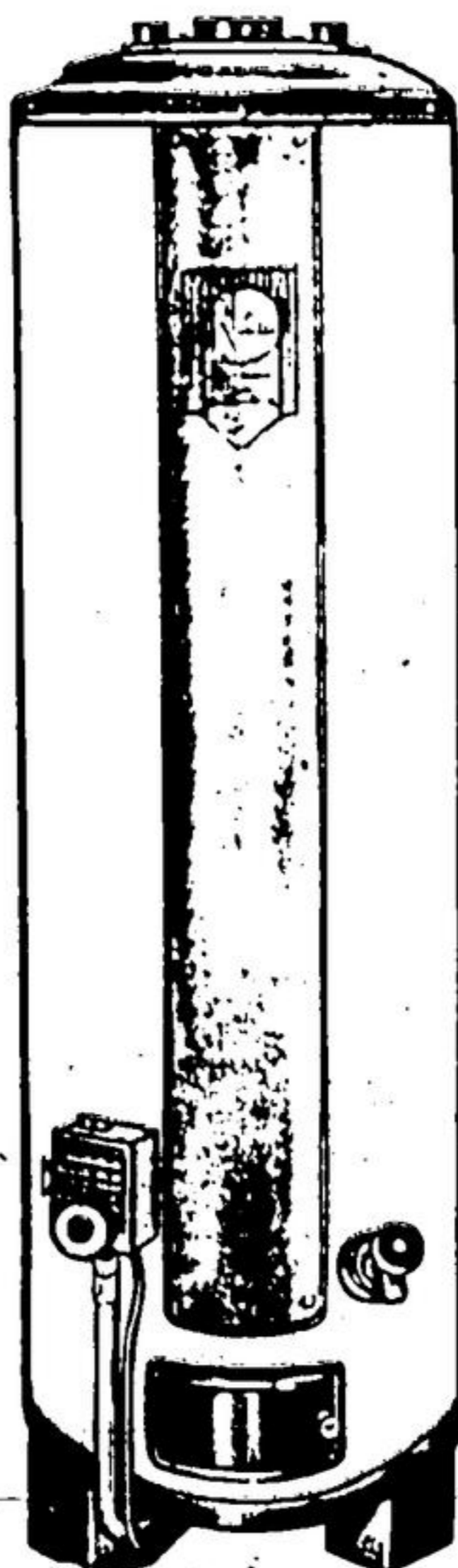
