Find Natural Gas on Van Vliet Farm, 5th Line

15th PRODUCER IS LARGEST TO DATE

The Anthony Gas well drilling crew sinking a shaft on the Van Vliet farm on the 5th line, just west of town, hit the jackpot last Saturday morning.

The well, one of many to be drilled near here by the gas explorations company, was brought in a few short hours before over 100 shareholders heard reports at the company's 7th annual meeting.

It is the 15th of 38 drilled to produce, and a company report said that this one is the largest to date. Drilling began on the site 6 weeks ago.

During the annual meeting, at Hornby almost immediately, shareholders heard the company's detailed information on where activities since it was first formed and learned that during the past three years approximately \$28,000 worth of natural gas has been sold to the United Gas Company.

Anthony Gas now has 13,000 acres under lease here and in Wellington county.

Capped Till Spring

Recently another company announced its entry into the fast growing field. Realm Mining Corporation Ltd., Toronto, has acquired more than 1,000 acres in three blocks of oil and gas leases in the Hornby area, adjacent to the Anthony lease. The Anthony wells in the Speyside area supply Milton, Acton and Georgetown, and those at Hornby will remain capped until the spring when a pipeline will be laid to take the gas to Milton.

The Speyside wells each produce between 100,000 and 500,000 cubic feet of gas per day, which is sold for 45¢ per thousand cubic feet.

Depths of the wells vary from 1,700 feet at Hornby to 2,000 near Speyside. The gas comes from the 600 foot thick Trenton limestone layer which in some places has three to four veins of gas. Pressure varies from 375 to 400 lbs. per square inch.

"We're just scratching the surface now," said Mr. Anthony Seynuck in his Acton office. "I think there's enough gas in Halton for 500 wells and it should last 50 or 60 years."

He said since 1957, his company had made \$117,000. Drilling costs about \$10,000 per well. This does not include the cost of pipes. The company also pays 12 and one half per cent in royalties if oil and gas is found on leased land.

The company has some 700 shareholders, seven directors including the president, a geologist and mining engineer and auditors. Price of the so far unlisted shares has been upped from one dollar to \$1.05 and no dividends are paid.

Discussing the report that Realm Mining wanted to buy his company, Mr. Seynuck said "We'll have to wait for a definite offer before it is discussed."

And Joseph S. Williams, QC, president of Realm said: "We are negotiating with Anthony but there are many things to be ironed out. We would like to buy the company outright."
