In moving for this new addition to Georgetown's municipal buildings, Cr. Jim Emmerson explained that it is also planned to house the ambulances in the structure.

At the same time, Sandy Best, M.P. has informed the Herald that the project has been okayed as a winter works program and the federal government will contribute \$1200 as its share of the estimated \$8,500 project.

Council Purchases New Police Cruiser

Purchase of a new Chevrolet police cruiser was ratified by council Monday, when Scott Motors tender of \$2700 was accepted.

The purchase caused a split when a recorded vote carried 5-3. Reeve Elliott, Deputy Reeve Hunter and Cr. McNeilly voted in opposition. Police chairman Don Barrager, whose committee recommended the purchase was not present at the council meeting.

Unanimous Choice. Last week three tenders were opened and turned over to the police committee for recommendation. The committee, at a Saturday meeting, decided on the Chevrolet which, though not the lowest, was the unanimous choice of all councillors who attended the committee meeting, according to the deputy reeve.

Mr. Hunter explained, that while he had signed his name to the purchase motion, he was not completely in agreement and had not decided to vote for it.

"There is a lower tender, but the chairman said the biggest percentage of police cruisers are Chevs, and a Chev can be serviced in town," he said.

Three Councillors Oppose Ward Voting

At last three local councillors are opposed to the ward voting system, according to statements made by them at a meeting of North Halton Urban Council Monday.

When minutes of that meeting were read at the Georgetown council meeting on Monday, they reported Cr. Jim Emmerson as expressing opposition to ward voting in towns of less than 20,000.

"Eventually it will rob the town of the cream of the crop and the net result will be a depopulation," Cr. Emmerson was reported as saying.

"It doesn't make for good government," was Cr. Jim Brown's quote while Cr. Bob McNeilly was reported as saying "I think some of the ratepayers who voted for wards wouldn't have done so if they knew what was involved."

Snow Shovellers Undo Plows Work Councillor Claims

Blasting residents who shovel snow back on the roads after they have been plowed by town workmen, Cr. Fred Harrison moved for preparation of a by-law which would penalize people who do this, at Monday's council meeting.

"I realize driveways are blocked when we plow the roads, but that's no reason for people to undo our work and block up the roads again," said Cr. Harrison.

"The people who do it are the ones who do the most complaining about having their roads snowplowed."

Cr. Brown, who with Deputy Reeve Hunter opposed the move, said he thought more thought should be given before a decision.

"In my area there is no alternative to shovelling snow on the road because the road is higher than the sidewalk and the sidewalks are under water if this isn't done."

"I'm talking about snow, not water, and it's ridiculous to clear roads and have them blocked by driveway shovellers," continued Cr. Harrison, as the motion passed.

Federation Protects... Also Punishes Members

"Many times you have heard never underestimate the power of a woman, but imagine the power of 22,500 women," said Miss Dorothy Martin, M.A. B.Ed., as she addressed the first meeting of the Eastern Association of Women Teachers last Thursday night.

She was referring to the number of members in the Ontario Federation of Women Teachers Association of which she is executive secretary.

"While size is not everything," she contended, "it is important to realize the power of 22,500 speaking with a single voice." Approximately fifty five public school teachers from Georgetown, Acton, and Etobicoke attended the dinner meeting, in Knox Church Hall, and heard the benefits of belonging to the Federation described by Miss Martin.

"Delegates can be sent to the conferences and the annual meeting, where your opinion can be heard, whether from a long rural school, or a large metropolitan one."

She offered some guidance in keeping interest high. Miss Martin suggested the seasons programme be made up in the fall with speakers and skits featured.

Committees with representatives from each school were formed. She urged the ladies of the Education and Finance Committee to look after salaries, and to represent the members at second board meetings, should it become necessary.

Salaries More in Line. She felt the emphasis on salaries is not as great as previously, since they have been brought more into line with other occupations. However, she strongly advocated a salary schedule setting out the minimum starting salary, and yearly increases, thus rewarding experience.

In her final words, Miss Martin emphasized the Federation's role. "If you have difficulties with your Board, write to us, we're here to help you. You know the Federation will stand up for you. Conversely," she warned "we will punish our own members if a contract is broken, or inefficiency proven. We can take away their teaching certificate."

Mrs. E. J. South the president of the local association thanked Miss Martin for making the trip out here, to help overcome the birth pangs of the new association.
