PUSH BUTTON RELIEF

Italian motorways (toll roads) have a system which makes it easy for motorists in difficulty to summon aid, the Ontario Safety League reports. Push button machines are placed in pairs near the roadside, every mile or so. One button signals a mechanical breakdown. Another button flashes a call for help at an accident scene where personal injury has occurred.

Rabies Losses Covered By County Indemnity

With the upsurge in cases of rabies, county council has enacted a by-law to provide for the indemnity to owners of animals, for losses suffered by rabies.

The Federal and Provincial governments pay the full indemnity, while the county pays the balance of the evaluation. Deputy coroner G. Leslie of Exeter suggested that \$5 per cent of the indemnity be paid to the evaluator. His suggestion was incorporated into a motion and adopted.

Approve Grants

The financial committee recommended that the following grants be made: approved by county council, the Halton Music Festival \$2,500, Canadian National Institute for the Blind \$1,000, St. John Ambulance \$200, Canadian Mental Health Association \$100, Nova League of Canada \$100, John Howard Society \$100, Masfield School for Retarded \$1,850.

County Subsidy

At a council meeting last week deputy coroner W. Hunter stated that the Georgetown Volunteer Fire Brigade is making calls to Hwy. 401, which is beyond their service area. Since they refuse to call this area, they are being subsidised financially.

Mr. Hunter asked that consideration be given to a county subsidy for volunteer ambulance services in the area.

Fraser to Speak To Holsteinmen

Mr. Jack Fraser, noted Holstein breeder, will be the guest speaker at the annual meeting of the Halton Unit of the Central Ontario Cattle Breeders' Association. The meeting is scheduled for Thursday, March 8th, in the Union Hall, Milton. During the morning the activities of the Halton unit will be presented. There will be a review of the contribution of artificial breeding in raising the quality of Halton's livestock. In addition to Mr. Fraser's address, Dr. C. R. Reeds, manager of the Central Ontario Breeders' Association and delegates to the annual meeting will be selected.

Halton Debaters Reach the Finals

The Halton County entry in the Ontario Junior Farmer Inter-County Debating competition was successful in making the finals.

In the semi-final round the team defeated the Northumberland entry, at a recent debate in Bowmanville.

The final debate will be held between Halton and Waterloo county on Friday, March 9th, at the Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph. The final debate will be part of the annual conference programme of the Ontario Junior Farmers' Association.

In the debating programme the Inter-University system is used and each county provides an Affirmative team and a Negative team. The county having the high aggregate score in both debates are declared the winners.

The first debate in the finals will be between the Waterloo affirmative team of Ruby Weaver and Elsie Ross, and the Halton negative team of Mary Lou Taylor and Ed Segaworth.

The second debate will be between the Halton affirmative team of Jack Robertson and Tom Hunter, and the Waterloo negative team of David Bridle and Paul Hayer.

The topic for the final debate is "Resolved That Farmers Should Process Farm Products."
