

Oakville Oaks Outscore Raiders Top League Position Still Open

Play-off Schedule in Readiness Drop Games to Meet Schedule

Georgetown Raiders chances of snatching away the Central Ontario hockey league flag for 1961-62 look a step backward on Sunday, when Oakville's Oaks outscored the locals to claim a 3-1 win and create a huge four point lead between their next step the league and the Raiders in second place.
