Seek Compensation For GVAS Volunteers

Georgetown should continue its efforts to have workmen's compensation provided for volunteer ambulance men, said Rev. John Elliott at Monday's council meeting.

So far, the town has been unsuccessful in convincing Queen's Park that ambulance drivers should be protected under the compensation act. Part of the reason, till now, is that Georgetown had the only volunteer service in Ontario and there is no legislation to cover this new public service.

On Monday, Cr. Jim Emmerson said that a similar group has been formed in Bolton, and this might strengthen Georgetown's case in seeking a private member's bill to introduce compensation for GVAS members.
