Roger Wade is Chairman Of Industrial Commission

Alex Blackwell Elected to Office of Vice Chairman

At the monthly meeting of the Industrial Commission, Roger Wade was elected chairman for 1962. Alex Blackwell assumed the newly-created position of vice chairman, and Peter Berry that of secretary treasurer.

At the beginning of the meeting both Deputy Reeve W. Hunter and Reeve Elliott who previously had been chairman and secretary treasurer respectively, declined to seek the positions again. "After two years it's time for a change," said Mr. Hunter. "I would like to point out that a chairman is just a chairman - nothing more," the deputy-reeve claimed. "He is no more responsible for bringing industry than anyone else at this table or anyone in town for that matter."

Work In Town
The election of Roger Wade as chairman was not accepted without considerable debate. Mr. Hunter felt the chairman should work in town where he would be available in the day time. H. Fobert, a member of the Commission, agreed with Mr. Hunter that the chairman should be available in daylight hours.

"How often does anyone drop in," asked Mr. Wade. "Many times," replied Mr. Hunter. "You're talking about the Standard Products, another Commission member, Mr. Hunter said, "You came without prior notice didn't you?" "Yes, we think the unannounced approach is best," Mr. Naporsan replied.

At the suggestion of Mayor Sargent, the members decided this difficulty could be overcome by the election of a vice chairman to substitute for the chairman when necessary. Alex Blackwell, manager of United Gas, was then elected to this post.

Both Harold Bairstow and Peter Berry were nominated for secretary treasurer. However, Mr. Bairstow declined and Deputy Reeve Hunter opted that with two sub-dividers, Delux Developments and Moore Park represented on the Commission it would be advisable to keep them on the same level.
