OTTAWA REPORT
BI-MONTHLY OBSERVATIONS BY SANDY BEST.
M.P. FOR HALTON



The House of Commons has been surprisingly quiet in recent days. Sometimes this is a good atmosphere in which to get a lot of legislation passed, and the last week has been no exception. The Farm Loan Improvement Act has been renewed for another period of several years, and the Small Business Loan Act has been reviewed. In the latter connection, it is hoped to make this legislation more attractive, more useful, for the many small businessmen who would like to avail themselves of these facilities through our chartered banks.

Estimates to various Government departments have already been before the House, and Members are able to ask detailed questions on spending plans from the Cabinet Minister in charge.

The terrorist acts of the radical Sons of Freedom Doukhobor Sect have been brought before the Commons on several occasions. Members of Parliament in British Columbia have requested further RCMP assistance and aid in replacing the dynamited electrical power unit which caused widespread disruption in this region. The Federal Government's arrangements regarding the RCMP in B.C. are with the provincial government of that Province, in a manner and sequence of responsibility somewhat similar to that which exists between Newfoundland and the Federal Government.

On the local scene, municipalities are working hard to take advantage of our Government's legislation in the construction of technical schools, sewage treatment plants, trunk lines, and other projects. I have had conversation with the Mayor and Council of Burlington, in this regard to assist the town in taking advantage of a 25 per cent CHMC Loan write off provision for work completed by the end of March, 1963. The problem in some cases appear to be the lengthy planning and local and provincial processing of such projects may make it difficult to have these entirely completed by March, 1963.

You may be interested to know that in technical school construction alone, the Federal Government's commitments to date are about \$300 million, and this must surely be by far our country's most massive attack on the technical training, future employment, and industrial growth to date. A year or two ago this country's students taking technical or vocational training numbered only a small percentage of those attending university. The present program should equalize or indeed, reverse these figures in the near future. In addition, of course, simultaneously, the Provincial Government's plans of change in the high school system, will take full advantage of the increased technical facilities, and while not closing any doors to the further education of a student at the college level, will nevertheless, give a more specialized basis in the high school years.

Fourteen tables were in play at the Equine Agricultural Society euchre in Stewarttown Hall on Friday evening.

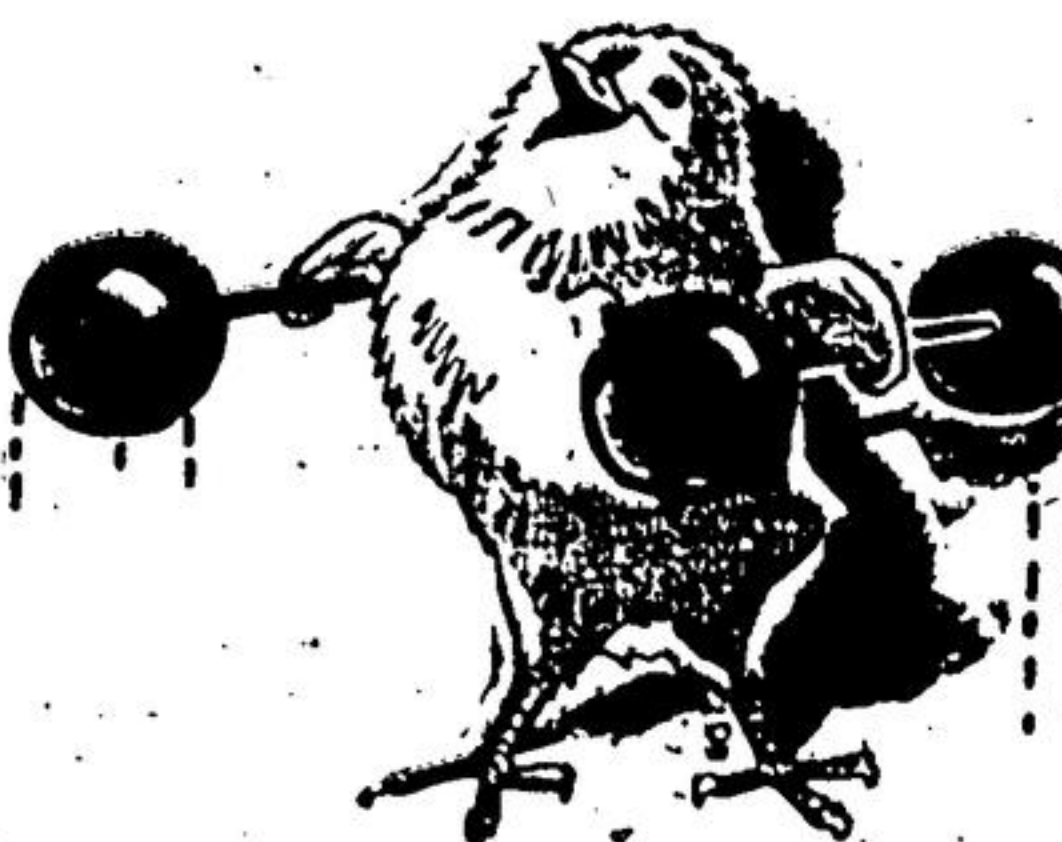
