● Presentation by the Legion branch President David Capperault. GROUP C (12-14 years) — Presentation by Saturday morning hockey league president Jim Ford.

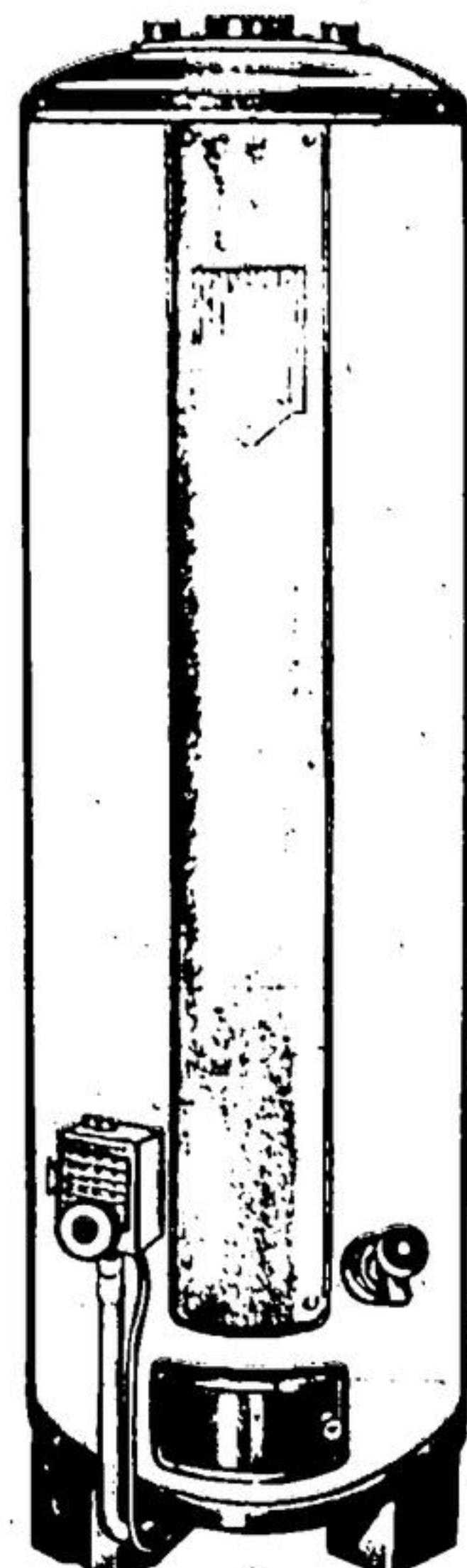
