Bantam tournament head Red Asseltine said this week that plans are all in readiness to feed, entertain and bed down some 650 young hockey players expected to invade the town during Bantam Hockey Week in late April (21 to 28). To date tournament officials and their assisting clubs and auxiliaries have lined up 133 beds plus 25 emergency beds, all that should be required to billet the boys — have arranged to served dinner and supper to the boys for the 8 days — and have arranged special events and movies to entertain them during the leisure hours.

Seek Information on Possibility of Dam

"It's foolish to spend much money on the 9th Line road if there is going to be action on creation of a proposed dam," said Cr. Fred Harrison at Monday's council meeting. The road is a serious problem, he said, and is presently closed off.

Credit Valley Conservation Authority has talked about a dam, and Cr. Harrison wants to know their plans before proceeding with road work.

Pay Largest Share

"We've poured \$30,000 into the Authority already," he pointed out.

"It will certainly cost the town thousands of dollars, for we would pay the largest share of the dam," remarked Deputy Mayor Hunter.

Cr. Harrison thinks that if a dam is planned, there should be action now in buying land.

"Land is no problem. Council attended a conservation meeting last year when Rex Maclop offered to donate some 300 acres and supply fill for a dam," said Cr. Jim Emmerson.

Wouldn't Count On It

"Donating in words is one thing, but it might be different now," answered Cr. Harrison. "I wouldn't count too much on that until we have land deeds."

Mayor Sargent said he would invite local conservation representatives Alex MacLaren and Fred Masterman to a future meeting to outline plans.

Escapes Custody, Later Surrenders to Police

A Huttonville man walked into Chinguacousy police station and gave himself up to Chief Snider Friday ending a search which started 24 hours earlier, following a series of wild happenings in the Georgetown area.

He was immediately charged with dangerous driving, escaping from custody, and assaulting a police officer.

Forced Off Road

The fantastic chase had its source at the corner of Main and Mill Streets where the accused allegedly drove through a red light. Cst. Ron Edwards, who saw the car go through the intersection immediately gave chase pursuing the speeding vehicle to and east on No. 7 Highway.

According to a police report Cst. Edwards attempted to pass the car twice before reaching the Norval hill but was forced off the road both times. At the top of Norval hill the fleeing car attempted to pass another eastbound car on the right side but spun out of control and came to a stop on the north side of the highway, half way down the hill facing in the opposite direction from which it had come.

Into The Bush

Cst. Edwards pulled over on the shoulder and was getting out of the cruiser when the car suddenly sped off again up hill and back toward town. At the

9th Line (Mountainview Rd.) the car turned north with the cruiser still on its tail. Another attempt to pass put the cruiser into a snow bank.

The chase continued at high rates of speed through Glen Williams and into Chinguacousy Township and apparently ended about 5 1/2 miles north of the Glen when the pursued car went out of control and plunged into deep snow. Edwards had started to put the handcuffs on the arrested man when he became violent and swung at the officer. He succeeded in cutting the policeman across the back of the neck with the open handcuffs, broke away, and fled into the bush. The O.P.P., who were called in while the chase was going on, assisted in the search.

When he gave himself up the next day he was taken to Milton and released a short time later on bail.
