Seek Ambulance Area Limit as Fire Area

A suggestion that ambulance calls be limited to town and the surrounding fire area served by the local fire department, found favour Monday with council.

But no official action was taken because of a disagreement that only local and provincial police and doctors be authorized to place ambulance calls.

The recommendation from the ambulance service was relayed by Reeve Elliott and supported by Cr. Emmerson who said GVAAS has answered false alarms and on some occasions arrives at a call to find the patient has been removed by private car.

Cr. Jim Brown disagreed. "I feel responsible citizens should be able to call if they give their name and assume responsibility for payment," he said. "They shouldn't be penalized because of a few pranksters."

Deputy Reeve Hunter was worried about delays in emergency cases, as was Cr. Cock Cr. Harrison said the fire department also had its share of false alarms... but I'd
