Membership in the Halton County Museum Association which will provide financial support for the museum, was begun last week when museum board chairman Herb Merry of Oakville sold the first tickets within a few minutes of receiving them from the printer. They were handed out to board members at their meeting in the court house, Milton, Monday afternoon, and will be sold throughout the county. Membership permits entry to the museum any time during the season.

Sandblasting of the interior of the barn which will house the museum at the Kelso site and other preparations were planned. The horse stable and cow barn — (grandly renamed the "foyer" and "great hall") — will be prepared as soon as possible so exhibits can be accepted for a spring opening. No date is set.

The barn so far contains very few exhibits. It was agreed a concerted appeal for donations would begin next month when the barn is ready. Official forms for acceptance are being readied.
