Raiders One Up In Bradford Semi-Finals

Thompson Goal Is Deciding Factor

Georgetown Raiders have secured their second win away from the Bradford Ford's to remain a one game lead in their best of five Central Ontario Hockey League semi-final. This time it was the stout goaltender of the Georgetown family that put a match to the final series to take a strong hold on the series.

Wayne Thompson, led by the night hockey through a penalty to Doug Falby, left a capital crowd slack jawed when he tucked the puck away from the Bradford blue net. He broke into daylight and beat B. Currie with a slap shot from twenty feet out that threatened an equalizer on the right side between Currie's elbow and the post.

That goal at 3:16 of the third period was the tally that snapped a 2-1 deadlock and enabled Raiders to get within a single game of the group finals. Raiders won the opening clash, also in Bradford 3-1, and allowed the Fords to pull even here Friday with a 4-4 tie.

The 4th game of the set was played here last night. Penalties which tend to play big parts in playoff hockey had a lot to do with the Sunday result.

Moie Galand was coming off in the villain's quarters when Gary Vasey struck with Bradford's first counter, set up by Bill Forham and Kelly at 2:37 of the initial stanza. Bradford still owned the 10' edge at the end of the period and decided it well to into the goal side frame but the same Moie Galand wiped out the match at 7:08 mark while the teams were five a side. Nicholas and Doug Richardson scored two minute sentences. Blake and Gerry Inglis collected assists.

Lead Slips

With just five seconds to go to midgame, Bob Demers punched the puck under the bar from a pushing session at the edge of the Bradford crease. Galand and Frazer Dunn had chopped at the loose puck and Georgetown grabbed the lead for the first time.

They carried it into the final twenty minutes but couldn't hold the hungry Fords in check for long. Bradford were on joying the odd man when Kwasnitsa launched a screened shot from just inside the blue line which fooled Smith, knotting things at 22.

The Wayne Thompson goal couldn't have been more of a surprise if it had been scored by Harry Houdini. When it bulged the twine about a minute and a half after Bradford's equalizer Thompson's cohorts gave him a reception on the bench that would have appro-

season. Frazer Dunn, pried open a two goal gap. He took a pass from Bob Demers on a rush, looked to go too far to the left to have a goal angle, and then whipped a backhand pass off who had shifted to cover Demers directly in front of the net.

Bradford pulled their goalie for 6 attackers with less than a minute to go but Raiders checked out too close to allow their lead to be threatened.

Brick Wall
One of the big reasons Bradford goals boomed only twice was the great defensive play of Georgetown's blueline brigade. Lee used two units. Gord Thompson and Gerry Inglis on one and Doug Falby and Gary Vasey the former Gord Terrier star on the other.

The four-man's efficiency is mirrored in the shots on goal statistics in which Raiders had a big 35 to 20 cushion.

Short on Defencemen Raiders Drop Second

Bradford Brad's Fords apparently don't believe in the use of sacrifices. Particularly in the one the Raiders relied on to get within two points of first place of the COHL this year.

Throughout the regular schedule the locals frequently used incomplete teams and still knocked off the cream of the league on a momentary lull. But the Raider machine, with missing parts doesn't roll as fast as the marshlanders.

Evenly Matched
The fact is that the Fords and Raiders are so evenly matched that a weak spot in either club usually leads to a black result for the team with absentees.

Near the end of the regular schedule Bradford came here with ten players and got flattened by a 12 to 4 score.

Friday Raiders went without their Doug Falby. Gary Vasey, defense man which had played a big part in their opening game win, and took the short

end of a 6-4 decision in front of 917 onlookers.

Blanked in Third
Bradford scored with seconds left in the first period to break a scoreless deadlock, and after Georgetown had lifted the lead in the middle period, scored again to tie it 4-4. Georgetown was blanked in the third period while the Fords beat Barry Smith twice.

Moie Galand, who for once rivaled coach Elmer Lee in orators between periods, claimed his shot which bounced off a cross bar either inside or outside the Bradford net, was a goal. Referee Donny Erwin and some of the crowd at the south end of the arena agreed with him. But the light didn't go on and if it did there would have been just as many who saw it the other way.

Brief Lead
Consequently it was Nicholas tally at the 19:28 mark that opened things and put Bradford one up going into the second period. Falson from Boyer and Hassard widened the gap after 12 seconds and Doug Richardson from Bill Vares kicked off the Georgetown come back at 2:54. Joe Vander passed to Jimmy Beaumont for the equalizer two minutes later, and Moie Galand from Wayne Thompson and Beaumont captured the lead for the locals at 5:51.

The Georgetown rise was cut short by ex-lead Bob Hassard's marker from Forham and Boyer at 6:16 with Gord Thompson sitting out a penalty, and Nick Olas Co-burn and Thornington combined to give the blue club a 4-3 advantage at the 12:37 mark. With Kwasnitsa off Raiders' power play produced the tying counter, Moie Galand the marksman from Blake Inglis at 19:11.

Struck Out
It was Gary Smith's lunge pass that Barry Walker's team their winning goal. Forham, credited with winner, was last to touch the elusive disc before it arched over Smith's head out of a scramble in the goal mouth. Instead of picking it off with his glove, the Raider goalie swung at it with his stick and struck out.

Georgetown's peppered the Ford cage in a desperate attempt to pull seven again, but their wide open hockey allowed Bradford enough chances to put it out of reach. Lorne Boyer took care of the insurance goal, with Kelly and Spider Gibson putting up assists.

Shots on goal were even, 29 Betty Sandifer approved.
