No Direction For Workshop Planners But on Purpose Speaker Says

General dissatisfaction with speaker Professor Anthony Adamson's remarks was the feeling expressed by the group at the Regional Planning Workshop last Thursday night. The audience felt he had given them no direction in the field of planning.

Professor Adamson, of the University of Toronto, is Vice Chairman of the National Capital Commission and former Reeve of Toronto Township. However, at the end of the evening John Pearson, of the Community Planning Branch of the Department of Municipal Affairs disclosed that Professor Adamson's talk was a "need" to start the many municipal representatives from Halton, Peel, and Wellington Counties thinking about finding their own answer for Regional Planning, since in the speaker's opinion planning at the local level is completely inadequate.

In Mr. Adamson's remarks he stated that the policy of development is the most important to determine, since once a municipality is in confusion there is no Santa Claus to fix it up. He felt the development policy had to be based on informed foresight, such as the projected rate of population, a sound idea of future debt, and sewer and storm drainage needs.

Always in the Red He outlined the different approaches of the three types of municipalities, the rural, the urban and the rural-urban. For the last he has coined a word, "rhubarb," because "it is a confused fast growing plant always in the red, and needs trimming frequently."

The rural municipality, he contended is represented by farmers interested in a stable agricultural economy. They can be guided more by past events, since change has not swept over the rural municipality to the same extent.

Two Interests The rural-urban or rhubarb, is a product of the automobile age, he maintained. "The value of land that is used for cow droppings has jumped in value five to ten times," he commented wryly. "Farmers are forced into the real estate business and speculation develops." He felt the council of this area has to represent two interests.

The urban and suburban council has to represent the lot owner, whose interest lies in the resale value of his house. Here the tug-of-war between assessment and taxes waxed strongest, and the competition for industrial assessment grows hottest.

Mr. Adamson outlined the basic areas of conflict in planning. First there is the Council vs Planning Board, then the rural vs local planning, public vs private (rightly possibly the most important question) and finally the Province vs the municipality conflict. At the end of the speaker's address, the representatives were divided up into study groups to answer a list of questions. From the questions the dissatisfaction with the speaker's remarks was revealed. An interesting revelation emerged from the question, "To the question 'Can a councillor be elected on a planning platform?' The answer from all present, each of whom

YO IMPROVE AND INCREASE SUGAR

To five pounds of coarse brown sugar, add 1 pound of flour, and there will be obtained 6 pounds of sugar worth 10 per cent more in colour and quality.
