

Veto Committee Fee for Cornerstone Ceremony

County Congratulates Champion Skaters

A motion that County Councillors attending the laying of the cornerstone for the new county building be paid the regular committee fees was soundly defeated last week.

Reeve Alex Phillips of Oakville stated: "I consider it an honour to be there." Deputy Reeve H. Gallagher of Burlington said in agreement: "There was no thought of remuneration."

Clerk G. Brown explained for the benefit of the press, that the motion had been initiated by any council member, but had been written by the treasurer in the hope of obtaining guidance.

\$160 For Money

Hydro Too High
Colorful will be the word for the washrooms in the new County Buildings, according to Architect N. A. Armstrong. He has recommended pale blue tile and pale yellow walls for the men's washrooms, and light gray tile with coral pink walls for the ladies' washrooms.

A cost of \$329 for complete underground hydro service to the building was deemed too high by the Council and rejected.

In reply to a letter from the North Halton Association for Retarded Children, asking consideration of a grant, an explanation of the County policy was given.

Grants will be paid to re-entrance schools for retarded children on the basis of \$1.50 per square foot, on receipt of a certificate of approval from the Department of Education.

A by-law to this effect is being drafted.

A telegram reading: "Congratulations from the residents and council of Halton County on your achievement in winning the World's Fair Figure Skating Championship" was sent by Warden Wilfrid Bird to Otto and Maria Jellinek of Oakville. The members felt their accomplishment well worthy of note.

Highest in Province
With the increase in the Old Age Pension, it was decided to increase the \$8 per month pocket money allowance of Centennial Manor residents to \$9.

"Don't you think the Manor Board is a little hard only giving \$1 of the increase?" asked Dr. Carl Martin of Milton. Reeve J. Hargreaves of Acton quickly replied: "The Act only permits us to give up to 15% of the pension for pocket money, and \$9 is that amount. Clerk G. Brown hastened to add: "Our home and one other give back the highest proportion of the pension of any home in the province."

Warden Wilfrid Bird just happened to have 25 tickets with him when Deputy Reeve H. Merry pointed out that anyone can join the Halton County Museum Association for \$1. This entitles the bearer to free admittance anytime.

"This way we hope the members will be enthusiastic enough to look for exhibits," commented Mr. Merry.

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BY-LAW NO. 617
TOWN OF GEORGETOWN
A By-law to amend By-law No. 57-91, being a restricted area zoning by-law, as amended by By-law No. 59-37, as amended by By-law No. 60-3, as amended by By-law No. 60-31.

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient to amend By-law No. 57-91, as amended by By-law No. 59-37, as amended by By-law No. 60-3, as amended by By-law No. 60-31;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN BY ITS MUNICIPAL COUNCIL ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. THAT section 51.3 is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section, which shall be known as Section 52.13 and which shall read as follows: "Notwithstanding any side or rear yard requirements in this by-law, two adjacent property owners may erect a garage with a joint party wall, provided such garage is detached from the main buildings on the two adjoining lots, and that the structure so added is compatible with existing buildings."

2. THAT Section 52.4 is hereby amended by adding thereto the following section, which shall be known as Section 52.4.10 and which shall read as follows: "Notwithstanding any side or rear yard requirements in this by-law, two adjacent property owners may erect a garage with a joint party wall, provided such garage is detached from the main buildings on the two adjoining lots, and that the structure so added is compatible with existing buildings."

3. That Section 7.2.1.1 is hereby amended to read as follows: "Permitted Uses: Shops for the repair, assembly or manufacture of small goods and wares, including parts for automotive bodies and similar items, laundries, printers, cleaners and dyers, storage warehouses, public garages, and service stations, which are not obnoxious." (as defined in Section 3-90) within enclosed structures or buildings."

4. THAT this by-law shall come into effect on the date that it is passed, subject to the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

BY-LAW read a first, second and third time and finally passed this 24th day of April, 1961.
