Manor Board Considers Land for Second Home

Halton, Centennial Manor Board is considering purchasing land for a second county home for the aged. At a recent meeting the secretary-treasurer asked the board if there should be an allowance in the 1962 budget for the purchase of land for an additional home for the aged.

More Beds
The Board considered the need of more beds in the bed care wing and a \$2,500 price was obtained on renovations. If approval of the Department of Welfare can be obtained, the work will go ahead.
As the present board room is too small, members viewed two rooms on the Manor's top floor which appeared satisfactory, and the estimates on renovating the rooms were to be obtained.

Day Rate
The board learned the daily cost of maintaining patients during 1961 was \$4.50 per day and agreed to use this figure again this year as the per diem rate for residents of the Manor.
The board approved increasing residents' monthly pocket money allowance to \$9 from the present \$8 due to an increase in the Old Age Pension now being paid. All county homes in Ontario, except Halton and one other, pay smaller allowances to residents.

Clam Breaker Used Breaks Ice Jam

The flood warning system received an unexpected workout last week and Peeli's emergency measures plan proved to be quick and efficient.
River ice began jamming at the Meadowvale bridge in the morning and threatened to back the Credit River into a flood. By noon water began to rise near several homes. River watchers reported the danger to Ted Speering at the warning control centre in Terra Cotta.
Mr. Speering phoned Peeli's EMO coordinator, Jack Adams at 1 p.m. which alerted the emergency measures staff. Toronto Township officials and the station officer, Bob Holmes, of Scarborough who was at the scene in 15 minutes.

Call in 'Clam Breaker'

Efforts to break the ice-jam proved in vain and finally emergency engineer Bob Cruise as head of EMO's emergency engineering unit, ordered a "clam breaker" on a waiting list for call-in as from Armstrong Bros. Co. Ltd. to be brought in. The device was a mobile crane which supported a "hammer" on the end of a cable.
Chunks Freed
The "clam-breaker" was dropped repeatedly on the ice jammed under the bridge, and gradually the chunks floated down the river.
