Quality Production Stressed To Farmers J. A. F. Quality hay production, increased grain yields, and weed control in corn, were featured at the annual Crops Day program. Sponsored by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association. The Crops Day was held at the Union Hall, Milton, on Thursday, March 29th. The programme included seed displays, education exhibit competition for Junior Farmer Clubs, speakers, a panel discussion and commercial exhibits.

Each of the farmers present had an opportunity to assess feeding value in hay by judging hay samples. Dr. W. S. Young, Field Husbandry Dept., Ontario Agricultural College, conducted the demonstration and outlined methods of improving hay quality.

Howard Henry, Field Crops Branch, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture, discussed increased feed grain production for Halton. Mr. Henry cited methods of increasing grain production in this area, and referred to research work recently carried out.

J. A. Francis, Agricultural Representative, was moderator for the panel discussion on improved crop production. Members of the panel included: Mr. Henry, Dr. Young, and Sam Newell, a farm operator from Wentworth county. Mr. Newell commented on the methods of weed control in corn, used on his farm.

The Norval Junior Farmer Club were the winners for the best educational exhibit. The exhibit featured soil management and erosion control.
