\$620,000 Road Work
In Halton Last Year

Halton County engineer Roy F. Smith presented his 32nd annual report on the work done on the county roads system, to members of Halton County Council last week.

Expenditures totalled \$620,036, broken down as follows — maintenance, \$213,318; grading and granular base, \$131,444; double treatment \$23,807; bridges and culverts, \$48,582; miscellaneous items, \$2,176; new machinery, \$24,161; rebates to towns, \$66,694; overhead, \$34,601; items not subject to subsidy, \$13,326; interest, \$2,501.

Winter Cost Down
Winter cost, consisting of plowing, snow plowing and snow fencing, was down about \$25,000 in 1961, compared to the previous year. The bulk of the plowing and sanding was done in February and March. The spring break-up was not too severe and the roads came through without serious damage, due to the absence of frost heaving, he said.

All gravel roads (about 40 miles), were treated with calcium chloride, while about 21 miles of light bituminous top pavements were treated with bitumen and stone chips. Weeds on the roadides were again treated with chemicals and the shoulders were cut with the tractor-mower.

New Work
Granular base construction continued on about seven miles of road and will receive a bituminous treatment or asphalt surface this year. Four concrete bridges, from 14 to 40 foot spans, were constructed, and another started in 1962 construction will be done on sections of 25 Sideroad near Acton, 17 Sideroad west of Georgetown and 10 Sideroad near Norval, the engineer reported.

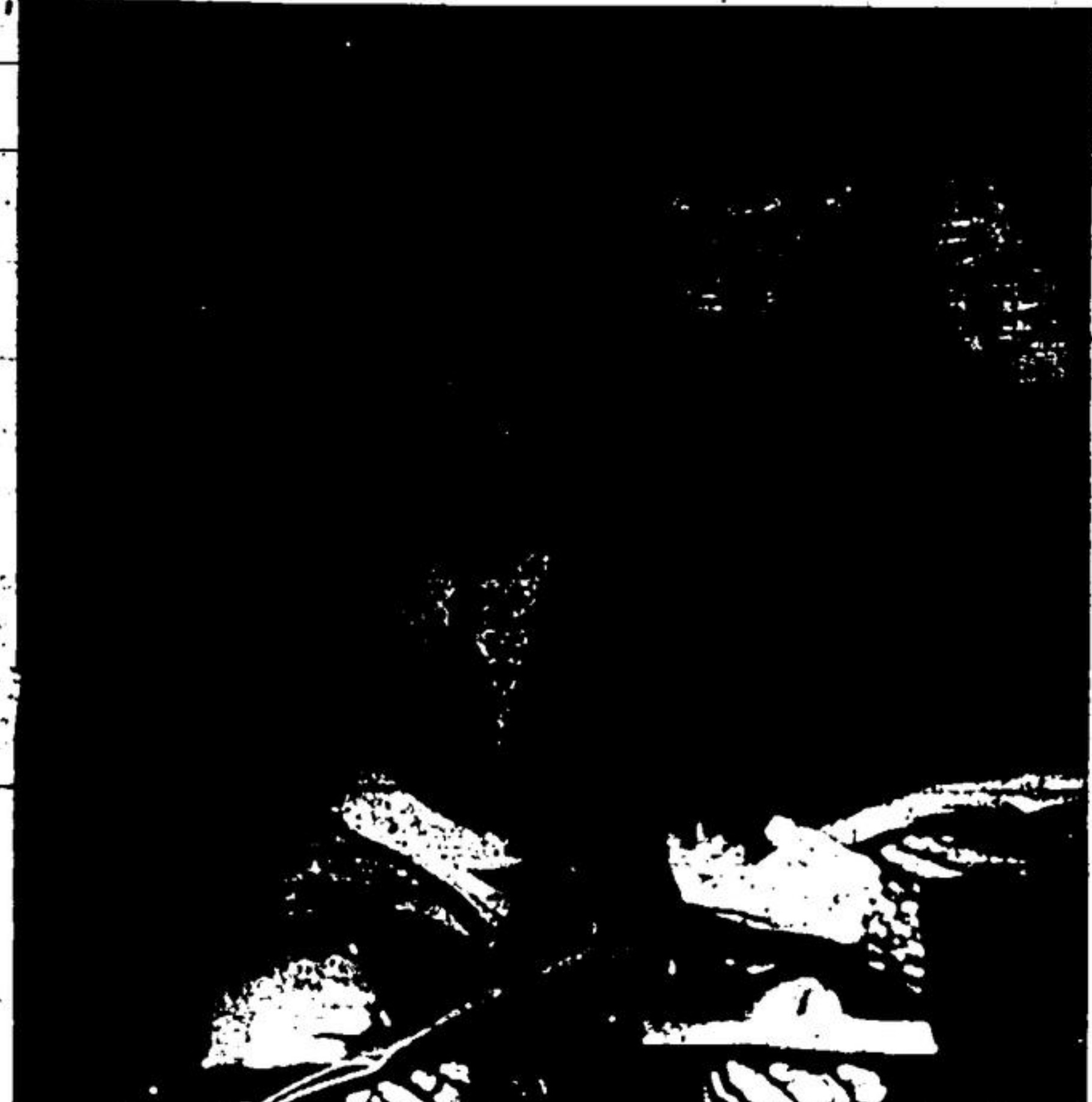
