Horsemanship Clinic Held, Wynfield Farms

Nearly 200 Ontario horsemen and women attended the 1st Western Horse Association of Ontario Horsemanship Clinic Sunday at Wynfield Farms, Georgetown, where Mr. and Mrs. Roy Linton hosted the talks and demonstrations in their recently erected arena. Members of affiliated clubs of the Western Horse Association of Ontario from Kitchener (The Parkway Saddle Club) from Galt (Central Saddle Club) from Watford (The Cedar Valley Riders Club) and from the River Tree Riding Club attended the demonstrations and lectures on various topics.

Training Methods — Those subjects receiving individual attention included — cutting horse, horse management, in which the care and grooming of the equine was discussed, demonstrations of training methods, of the well trained Pleasure Horse and various Games Closets of the Cowboy and Cowgirl shown at Rodeos, Gymkhanas, and Horse Shows throughout the country.

Cow Sense — After lunch the program dealt with Western Equitation, a subject too often forgotten in the training of persons who are starting to ride. Reining horses and call to the spotlight too, and the program was concluded with an exciting event, (not too far from the program).
